Moved by Mr. Barre seconded by Mr. Songy that a Gate be erected at Tigerville lane. Adopted.

Offered by Mr. LeBrun seconded by Mr. Songy.

Be it ordained by the Police Jury of the Parish of St. John the Baptist State of La. in regular session convened on the 4th day of Feb. in the year 1915.

All vehicles meeting each other on the public highways shall pass each other on the right. A vehicle overtaking an other shall pass on the left side of the overtaken vehicle and not pull over to the right until entirely clear of it.

The slower moving vehicle shall as for as conditions permit pull to the right in order to allow the faster moving one to proceed.

A vehicle in turning a curve in the road shall keep to his right.

In slowing up or stopping signals shall be given to those behind by raising the whip or hand.

All motor vehicles traveling on the public highways shall be provided with a light at night.

The speed limit of all vehicles shall not be over 25 miles per hour and in curves 8 miles.

All motor vehicles in overtaking an other vehicle shall before passing same give a warning by blowing the horn also in approaching curves.

Be it further ordained etc that any person or persons violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be subject to a fine of not less than five dollars nor more than Twenty five dollars or to imprisonment for not more than 30 days or both within the discretion of the court having proper jurisdiction.

Be it further ordained that this ordinance become effective 30 days after the first publication adopted.

Moved by Mr. Songy seconded by Mr. LeBrun that Mr. Gaston Galliot having been elected Treasurer at the regular meeting of Jan. 7th 1915 and having qualified he is hereby empowered to act as such. Adopted.

There being no further business on motion, duly seconded, the Jury adjourned.
