**TRUCK SEASON ON.**

With shallotes, beets, carrots, radishes, lettuce, and other vegetables being at good figures, the busy season of the truck farmers now in full swing, is proving remunerative to the farmers in St. Rose, and Charles parish.

Especially good have been some of the sales of shallotes, which ran as high as \$10 per barrel. Large quantities of vegetables are being shipped to Northern, Eastern and Western cities from St. Rose and near-by sections, including Kent, Ama and Montz. It is believed that cabbages will sell better than they did last season, the acre in that kind of truck being smaller. An exceptionally heavy crop of garlic will be ready for shipment in about a month.

An express case has been established at Am in St. Charles parish, across the river from St. Rose, which is proving of great advantages to farmers of that section, who herto transported their produce to St. Rose for sale and shipment.

At Montz, in the upper part of St. Charles parish, and also at La Place, in St. John parish, packing houses are in operation.

Trucksters of those sections are also shipping their produce to New Orleans.
