SCHOOL BOARD
Parish Of St. John The
Baptist.

Edgard, La., Feb. 7, 1918.
The School Board assembled this day in regular monthly session.

The following members were present:—Messrs. Abadie, Millet, Alexander and Webre.

Absent, Mr. Gendron and Dr. Feucht.

The Secretary read the minutes of the previous meeting and on motion of Mr. Webre seconded by Mr. Millet and carried, they were approved as read.

It was moved by Mr. Alexander that Mr. Philips, Principal of the Wallace School, be given his release provided he could be immediately replaced. This motion was seconded by Mr. Millet and carried unanimously.

It was moved by Mr. Webre and seconded by Mr. — that the following approved bills be paid. There being no objection, it was so ordered:—

WHEREAS, the School Board borrowed sufficient sums of money to operate the schools nine months last year and

WHEREAS, the School Board borrowed sufficient sums of money to paint and repair the school houses last year, and

Whereas, after operating the schools five months the School Board finds its funds exhausted, and

Whereas the Superintendent has made it clear that a school session of less than nine months duration is not to be thought of because pupils would require two years to be promoted to a higher grade, therefore

Be It Resolved that the President be authorized to negotiate with any bank or banker the necessary notes to secure the loan of sufficient sums of money to operate the Schools four additional months.

There being no further business on motion of Mr. Alexander seconded by Mr. Webre and carried the Board adjourned.
