Proceedings Of The SCHOOL BOARD Parish Of St. John The Baptist.

Edgard La., April 9, 1918. The School Board assembled this day in regular monthly meeting with President E. O. Abadie in the Chair. The following members were present: Messrs. Millet, Webre, Alexander and Dr. Feuchr, Absent, Mr. Gendron.

The Secretary read the minutes and on motion of Mr. Alexander, seconded by Mr. Webre, they were approved as read.

The Secretary read the report of the Grand Jury and by a unanimous vote the Board approved the wise and timely suggestions offered. It is hoped that with proper legislation to be obtained through the Legislature next month the schools can be placed on a substantial financial basis.

It was moved by Mr. Alexander and seconded by Mr. Millet and unanimously carried that the Rally be held on the 27th inst., and that a small admission be charged to all except pupils to defray the expenses of the Rally.

On motion of Mr. Alexander seconded by Dr. Feuchr and carried, Physiology and Zoology were included in the list of events for the Parish Rally.

It was moved by Dr. Feuchr, seconded by Mr. Millet and carried, that two lightning rods be placed on the Garyville School.




