OFFICIAL PROCEEDINGS OF THE POLICE JURY

Parish of St. John the Baptist.

Edgard, La., December 4, 1919.

The Police Jury met this day in
regular monthly session with the
president, A. Lasseigne, and Messrs.
Barre, Songy, Cassagne and Babin,
present. Mr. Reynaud, absent.

The minutes of the previous meet-
ing were read and approved.

Moved by Mr. Songy, seconded by
Mr. Babin, that the rate of taxation
for the year 1919 be and the same is
hereby fixed at five (5) mills on the
dollar, out of which one and one-half
(1 1/2) mills shall be set aside and
used for school and educational pur-
poses and three and one-half (3 1/2)
mills shall be set aside for parish pur-
poses, and an additional one and one-
half (1 1/2) mills for school purposes.

Moved by Mr. Cassagne, seconded
by Mr. Barre, that an extra special
tax of one and one-half (1 1/2) mills
on the dollar be levied for the pur-
pose of paying the principal and in-
terest on Bonds sold for good roads
purposes. Adopted unanimously.

It was moved, seconded and carried
that the president be authorized to
borrow a sum sufficient to meet cur-
rent expenses.
