

### Official Proceedings

—Of The—

#### School Board

Parish of St. John the Baptist.

Edgard, La., June 2, 1921.

The School Board assembled this day in regular monthly session with President E. O. Abadie in the Chair, and the following members present: Messrs. Alexander, Bourgeois, Tassin Millet and Gendron. Absent, None.

The Secretary read the minutes of the last meeting and on motion of Mr. Alexander, seconded by Mr. Bourgeois, and carried, the minutes were approved as read.

Messrs. Montegut and Broussard appeared before the Board and asked for an increase in salary. The Superintendent recommended that the same salary schedule be adopted. After a thorough discussion of the matter, it was moved by Mr. Alexander, seconded by Mr. Bourgeois, and carried that the Principals of the two High Schools and the Superintendent be allowed an increase in salary of five dollars per month and that the same scale of wages relative to teachers be adopted.

The Superintendent inquired as to the employment of married ladies as teachers. It was understood that married ladies would be employed only in case of necessity.

The Secretary read the report of the State Supervisor of Home Economics as follows:

Superintendent T. H. Harris, Baton Rouge, Louisiana.

Dear Mr. Harris: This is to advise that the home economics departments in St. John parish, namely Edgard and Reserve, have met the requirements and recommendations set forth in my report to you on January 24, and are entitled to remain on the list of approved home economics departments.

Respectfully submitted,

(Signed) Cleora C. Helbing, State Supervisor of Home Economics. The Superintendent reported that the school session had been a success in every way but that the work in the two-room schools was not as good as it might be, because the teachers in the two-room schools had too many grades to teach. He recommended that the Seventh Grade of the two-room schools be transferred to larger schools.

#### POLICE JURY

Parish of St. John the Baptist

Edgard, La., June 2nd., 1921.

The Police Jury met this day in regular session with the Hon. P. G. Songy in the Chair and the following members present: Messrs. Reynaud, Barre, Montegut, Duhe and Bourgeois. Absent, None.

The minutes of the last meeting were read by the secretary and on motion by Mr. Barre, seconded by Mr. Duhe and carried, said minutes were approved as read.

The Finance Committee's report showing a total of \$2,289.36 to cover bills incurred and salaries for the month of May, was read, and on motion by Mr. Barre, seconded by Mr. Duhe and carried, said report was accepted and said bills and salaries were ordered paid.

Mr. A. M. Montz appeared before the Jury relative to his fence obstructing the road in the fourth ward, and on motion of Mr. Montegut, seconded by Mr. Duhe and carried, it was ordered that the Secretary be and is hereby directed to notify the Highway Department to send one of its engineers to draw the exact line and to meet the members of the Police Jury and Mr. Montz in an effort to have this matter satisfactorily arranged.

The resignation of Mr. Gerard Oubre as road man in Road District No. 1 was read and on motion of Mr. Barre, seconded by Mr. Reynaud, aid resignation was ordered accepted.

An application from Willie Melancon, Sr. of La Place for the post of road man to succeed Mr. Oubre was read, and on motion of Mr. Bourgeois, seconded by Mr. Reynaud and carried, Mr. Melancon was appointed to said post, said appointment to take effect at once.

It was moved by Mr. Duhe, seconded by Mr. Reynaud and carried that the Parish purchase from Mr. C. F. Montegut, a four wheel wagon for hauling gravel, said wagon to cost \$75.00. The treasurer's report, filed by Ben Dufresne, parish treasurer, showing the following cash balances on June 2nd., after paying all checks issued said date:

was read and on motion of Mr. Barre, seconded by Mr. Bourgeois, and carried said report was accepted.

The application of Miss Marcelle Millet for Parish beneficiary scholarship to the State Normal School at Natchitoches was read and on motion of Mr. Duhe, seconded by Mr. Reynaud, and carried, action on same was deferred until the next regular meeting to allow all applicants sufficient time to file their applications.

There being no further business, on motion duly seconded and carried, the meeting adjourned.

### OFFICIAL Proceedings of POLICE JURY

La Place, La., June 22nd., 1921.

In accordance with a resolution passed at the regular meeting held on June 2nd., the Police Jury met this date at La Place, La. on the property of Mr. A. M. Montz, with Hon. P. G. Songy President and the following members present: Messrs. Reynaud, Barre, Montegut, Duhe and Bourgeois Absent—None.

This being a special meeting, the minutes were dispensed with, and the question of the removal of the fence on the property of Mr. A. M. Montz was immediately taken up with Mr. Montz, owner of the property in question, and Mr. Magoon, locating engineer for the State Highway Department. The exact lines of the Highway were located by Mr. Magoon, and the case finally compromised with Mr. Montz, whereby Mr. Montz will move back his fence approximately 10 feet, thus giving to the highway approximately the required width minus a few feet. It was further agreed that the fence will be moved by Mr. Montz himself, and the road completed by the parish as soon as the fence will be moved.
