We had an appreciative call from F. A. Leonard, of Shreveport on Friday last week.

Mr. Leonard is having the Land Grants placed upon record in the parishes where the V. S. & P. R. R. own lands.

The merchant will have to begin to make up his mind to have many propositions for "arrangements," before long. The House committee on grounds and public buildings have reported favorably on Mr. Newton's bill to appropriate \$100,000 for a public building at Monroe, La.

This begins to look like business. We hope Monroe will get this building.

Mr. Newton introduced a bill removing the restriction against ex-Confederates entering the United States army or navy.

The above is an excellent move. Hope it will pass. Mr. Newton will represent his constituents and if the bill passes it will be one of his notable achievements.

THE LOUISIANA BAR.

It was a matter of surprise to well informed legal men throughout the country that President Cleveland did not select a Louisiana lawyer instead of a Mississippi lawyer for the position to which Mr. Lamar was appointed. It is a matter of fact that to practice law in Louisiana requires more legal knowledge than almost any other state in the Union. We have before alluded to this subject.

An applicant in Louisiana to the bar does not only have to have a knowledge of the Common Law but the Civil Law. In fact the Civil Law part of our State is much more extensive than the Common Law portion of the practice. Owing to the fact that many cases of this nature come up before the Supreme Court of the United States renders it highly important that a Civil law attorney should be on the Supreme Bench of the United States. Mr. Cleveland, however, seemed to take a different view of the case, and ignored Louisiana altogether.

Is it not a fact that some of the greatest legal heads the world ever produced came from Louisiana? For instance, Mr. Benjamin, whose opinion in one case was said to be worth \$70,000.

Then why ignore the "Pelican" State in selecting positions for men who should possess legal knowledge?

IMMIGRATION.

We copy the following letter addressed to the P. M. here: "Longton, Kansas, Jan. 16th. To the Post Master, Rayville, Louisiana.

DEAR SIR:—Owing to the enormous cold blizzards in Kansas, I desire to seek a milder climate in the South. Your latitude seems to be an agreeable temperature all the seasons of the year. I assume the liberty of addressing you in regard to that portion of Louisiana. I desire to ask some questions concerning that portion of the State, and if it is not agreeable with you, won't you give this to some real estate agent or some one else who will give a reply?

What is the average temperature of your climate for all seasons of the year? What is the principal staples of production in your portion of the State? What fruits are grown there? Does the negro cause any trouble? What are the religious advantages and social conditions of the people? What is the price of lands generally? The quality of the soil? Is the land level or undulating? Is the water soft or hard, and how plentiful?

Will you oblige me by having one, two or three copies of your best paper sent to me? I consider a good paper a fair index of a town or county. What is the size of your town now?

Please let me hear from you, or some one else in regard to the above soon and oblige. Respectfully, J. F. RICHARD.

By request we sent half dozen copies of the BEACON to the above address. It is unfortunate for the parish and locality that the local merchants do not advertise in the parish paper. Aside from any pecuniary interest it does not speak well. It shows a lack of enterprise. Those at a distance will naturally think that a town that does not furnish even one business advertisement is certainly a dead town and country. We have called the attention of our merchants to this matter time after time, they seem to take an erroneous view of the matter. They are too much inclined to the idea that self interest is consulted. They do not seem to realize the fact that money paid for advertising is judiciously spent and that they get value received. No out lay pays better. The success of every business enterprise depends upon the enterprise and energy of those engaged in the enterprise.

One of the most candid, honest and sensible things we have seen of late is the announcement of a candidate for Sheriff over in one of the bill parishes. He says that he announces before hand that if he should be elected that a certain gentleman, giving his name, will be his deputy. This struck us as honest and candid. Some candidates will offer a dozen men positions as deputies who are totally unfit for the position, but when a candidate comes out and says who he will have there is no way of misunderstanding him on that point.

At Limestone, Indian Territory four robbers entered a bank, ordered the cashier to deliver the cash. He locked the vault. The robbers shot him, killing him instantly; they secured \$2300 from the drawers and just as they were mounting the citizens attacked them. One robber was killed and several citizens wounded, the citizens pursued and captured the other three, hung the leader and turned over the other two to the United States authorities. They should have been hanged also.

Louisiana Republicans.

A List of Old Time Radical Manipulators Brought to the Front.

New Orleans, La., Jan. 25.—The Republican convention was called to order at 12:30. Chairman Cage announced that the committee on credentials would not be ready to report till 2 p. m. Convention took recess till 2:15 p. m.

The convention has just nominated the following State ticket by acclamation: For governor, H. C. Warmouth, of Plaquemine; lieutenant governor, H. C. Stator, of Terrebonne; secretary of State, J. F. Patten, of St. Mary; State treasurer, Andrew Hero, of Orleans; State auditor, J. Forsythe, of Catahoula; attorney general, W. G. Wylie, of East Carroll; superintendent of education, B. F. Flanders, of Lafayette.

Judge A. A. Gumby has been in our town this week. We conversed with the Judge upon the subject of National aid to education and upon the political issues of the day, and found him exactly in accord with us on these points. He is in favor of National aid. He is also in favor of white primaries to determine the choice of the intelligent people as to who should fill the offices. We are with him on this issue.

The cause of white primaries was not successful this time but we are not discouraged. The movement is stronger than ever before and we feel confident that the rule will be adopted throughout North Louisiana if not in every parish in the State before the next gubernatorial campaign.—Ouachita Telegraph.

Let the white people act in primaries if we expect to get at the choice of the intelligent and representative men of the country.

Louisiana congressmen have been assigned to committees as follows: Gay, on appropriations; Logan, commerce; Blanchard, river, harbors and militia; Robertson, military affairs and improvement of the Mississippi; Wilkinson, war claims and coinage, weight and measures; Newton, public buildings and the eleventh census. Catchings, of Vicksburg is second on the river and harbor committee and chairman of the committee on improvement of the Mississippi.

PROMULGATION.

Proposed Amendments to the Constitution of the State of Louisiana. Adopted by the General Assembly in 1884 and 1886.

STATE OF LOUISIANA, Office of the Secretary of State. IN PURSUANCE of the provisions of the Constitution, publication is hereby made and given to the qualified electors of the State of Louisiana of the proposed amendments to the Constitution of this State, which have been introduced by the members elected to each house of the General Assembly of this State, at the regular sessions thereof, held at the city of Baton Rouge, in the years 1884 and 1886, and which are required to be published for the information of the qualified electors of this State for three months next preceding the general election for Representatives, and which proposed amendments more fully appear in Act No. 43 and Joint Resolution No. 112 of the Regular Session of 1884, and in Joint Resolutions No. 28, 75, 88 and 92 of the Regular Session of 1886, which are hereinafter officially published for the information of the qualified electors of this State, and which will be submitted to them for their approval or their rejection, at the next general election, which will be held on Tuesday, the 17th day of April, A. D. 1888 (it being the Tuesday next following the third Monday of said month) in such manner and from that the qualified electors may vote for or against each amendment separately, and if a majority of the qualified electors voting, at said election, shall approve and ratify all or either of said proposed amendments, then such proposed amendments, or amendments of either of them, so approved and ratified, shall become a part of the Constitution of this State.

Act No. 43 of the Regular Session of 1884. Amendment No. 1. TULANE UNIVERSITY AMENDMENT.

The terms of Act No. 43, of the Regular Session of 1884, adopted at the session of the Legislature in the year 1884, are hereby amended and approved; and all provisions of the Constitution of 1857 repugnant thereto, or in any way impairing the passage thereof, are hereby repealed, so far as the operations of said act are concerned.

Joint Resolution No. 112 of the Regular Session of 1884. Amendment No. 2.

"The General Assembly may divide the State into levee districts and provide for the appointment or election of Levee Commissioners in said districts, who shall in the method or manner to be provided by law, have supervision of the erection, repair and maintenance of the levees in said districts; to effect the Levee Commissioners may levy a tax not to exceed ten mills on the taxable property, situated within the alluvial portions of said district subject to overflow, provided that, in case of necessity, to raise additional funds for the purpose of constructing, repairing and repairing any levees protecting the lands of the district, the rate of taxation, herein limited, may be increased when the rate of such increase and necessity and purpose for which it is intended shall have been submitted to a vote of the property tax payers in such district, paying taxes for himself, or in any representative capacity, whether resident or non-resident, or property situated in the alluvial portion of said district subject to overflow, and a majority of those in number and value voting at such election, shall have voted therefor."

Joint Resolution No. 28, of the Regular Session of 1886. Amendment No. 3.

"In those districts composed of one parish, there shall not be less than six terms of the District Court each year."

"In all other districts, there shall be in each parish not less than four terms of the District Court each year, except in the parishes of Cameron, Franklin and Vernon, in which District Court each year, there shall be two terms of the District Court each year."

"Until provided by law, the terms of the District Court in each parish shall be fixed by a rule of said court, which shall not be changed without notice by publication at least thirty days prior to such change."

"There shall be in each parish not less than two jury terms each year, at which a grand jury shall be empanelled, except in the parishes of Cameron, Franklin and Vernon, in which there shall not be less than one jury term each year, at which a grand jury shall be empanelled."

"At other jury terms the General Assembly shall provide for special juries, when necessary for the trial of criminal cases."

Joint Resolution No. 75, of the Regular Session of 1886. Amendment No. 4.

Article 180—"The New Basin Canal and Shell Road and their appurtenances shall not be leased nor alienated."

Joint Resolution No. 88, of the Regular Session of 1886. Amendment No. 5.

Article 62—"That in the event of the death, or from whatever cause the office of Lieutenant Governor shall become vacant then, and in that event the President pro tempore of the Senate shall fill the office of Lieutenant Governor, performing all the duties incident to the office and receiving its emoluments."

Joint Resolution No. 92, of the Regular Session of 1886. Amendment No. 6.

Article 207—"The following property shall be exempt from taxation, and no other, viz: All public property, places of religious worship or burial, all charitable institutions, all buildings and property used exclusively for colleges or other educational purposes, and the personal estate of any public library, and that of any other literary association, used for or connected with such library; all books and philosophical apparatus, and all paintings and statuary of any company or association kept in a public hall; provided, the property so exempted be not used or leased for purposes of private or corporate profit or gain; There shall also be exempt from taxation household property to the value of five hundred dollars; there shall also be exempt from taxation and license for a period of twenty years from the adoption of the Constitution of 1879, the capital, machinery and other property employed in the manufacture of textile fabrics, leather, shoes, harness, saddlery, hats, flour, machinery, agricultural implements, manufactures of ice, fertilizers and chemicals and furniture and other articles of wood, marble, or stone, soap, stationery, ink and paper, boot building and chocolate; provided, that not less than five hands are employed in any one factory."

In testimony whereof I have hereunto affixed my signature and attached thereto the seal of the State of Louisiana at the city of Baton Rouge this 13th day of January, A. D. 1888.


