

THE BATTLE STATES.

We take the following timely and suggestive extract from an able article in the New York Herald of Friday:

"The result of the recent elections in the South, North and West show that the battle for the preservation of the government from hands that would administer it on principles destructive to every great interest in the land, and to the Union itself, must be fought in the great commercial, manufacturing and mining States of New York, New Jersey and Pennsylvania."

From these results it will be seen that its gains have been nothing at all in the aggregate, if we except the State of Connecticut, where the State election of 1856 took place before the Republican party was organized...

It is obvious from the foregoing facts and figures, that Black Republicanism is in a woeful minority in these main battle States of New York, Pennsylvania and New Jersey, in 1856, just four years ago, when there was a popular minority against the "irrepressible conflict" in those States alone of two hundred and fifty-one thousand six hundred and seventy (251,670)!

New York Fusion at Last.

It is a fact—That Mr. Breckinridge dare not answer said questions, because, if he answers as Douglas did, he will lose the disunion vote in the south; and if he answers them to please Yancey, he will lose all the anti-Yancey votes.

Mr. Crittenden on the Territorial Question. The Hon. John J. Crittenden, in a recent speech, made the following forcible remarks:

Now I wish to say a word upon Territorial slavery. All this fiery animosity and fiery contest between the different branches of the Democratic party grows out of this question. Whether, if we had a Territory where there was slavery, and where there was an opposition to that slavery, whether the Congress should interfere by its laws and settle the question by protecting that property, or whether it should be left to the wishes of the people of the Territory to do as they will with the institution? That is the question.

Look at the condition of our country and see if these gentlemen are not quarreling about a mere abstraction—a thing of air—beating the air, and yet turning the country almost upside down about it. The question as to slavery in Kansas everybody thinks is settled. As to Nebraska, with its frosty, cold regions, nobody wants to go there that can get a living elsewhere. That is conceded. Across the Rocky Mountains does anybody want to carry slaves? That is conceded. These are our Territories—Where is that Territory to which a man would carry slaves if he were invited to do it? In the great basin just this side of the Rocky Mountains—a vast plain without a tree—uninhabitable almost to a great extent. Does any one want to go there with his slaves? No. There is not, in my judgment, one single spot of any considerable extent in any Territory of the United States, where any man would desire to carry his slaves, and yet the whole contest is as to what is to be done when the people carry their slaves where they don't want to carry them. For this Mr. Douglas is pursued and pursued.

Mr. Douglas says: "I want to carry out what was proposed—as I understood it, at the repeal of the Missouri Compromise—that is, to put the question out of Congress, and leave it to the Territory, and then let the people quarrel it out." It is better that a partial evil should take place than that a general quarrel should exist in the Union. Are we, the people of the United States of America, to be put at the tail of these little people, and to suffer the agitation that their petty contests shall bring up? That seems like reversion.

The whole question between the branches of the Democratic party, is as to slavery in the Territories. Has there any such mischief been done yet—is there any case requiring interposition? No! Why, the United States Senate, upon the direct question, said no—there is no present evil that requires remedy, but it may come. Another flood may come, [laughter] or if not, then there may come another destruction of the earth by fire. It is worth our while to provide against it!

Synopsis of Buchanan's Administration.

6th The enormous defalcations of public officers and general stealing in all the departments of the government, unprecedented in the past history of the country, and not even equalled or surpassed by the administration of Martin Van Buren.

7th Using extraordinary exertion to prevent American colonization in Central America by intercepting General Walker and his gallant little band, and finally permitting them to be caught by British cruisers and delivered to the Spanish authorities to be shot, thereby allowing a British protectorate to be extended over Central America in violation of treaty stipulations entered into with us.

8th Employing the patronage of the government in the national convention at Charleston and Baltimore for the purpose of bringing up the Democratic party, and thereby trying to secure the election of a Black Republican to the Presidency.

9th Acting Janus-faced and playing a double game with the North and South in regard to Kansas, and the bribery of Congressmen to vote for the Leecompton constitution.

10th The general public demoralization growing out of the neglect of law officers of the government to apprehend and prosecute public defaulters, according to the requirements and provisions of the sub-treasury law.
