

ARTIFICIAL EYESIGHT—*Singular if true.*

—The Revue Francaise says that a French

physician, Dr. Blanchet, having arrived at

the conclusion that we do not see with

the eyes, but with the brain through the

eyes, experimented with a view to find

some means of conveying the rays of

light through the diseased eyes to the

retina. After eighteen-years of study,

he has at length perfected a discovery

which must be of the greatest import-

ance. By the aid of a little glass cylin-

der, to which he gives the name of *point*

lumiere, he puts the optic nerve again in

communication with the exterior world,

and enables the blind to see. It is diffi-

cult, however, that vision so obtained,

can be equally distinct with that of the

natural eye.
