

NATIONAL RECONSTRUCTION PARTY.

HALL OF HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES,
New Orleans, March 23, 1867.

At an informal meeting of the members of the General Assembly of the State of Louisiana, held this day in the Hall of the House of Representatives, the Hon. T. P. Harrison, of Morehouse, was called to the chair, and Geo. B. Shepherd, Esq., requested to act as secretary.

On motion of the Hon. J. B. Elam, of de Soto, it was

Resolved, That a committee of thirteen be appointed by the chair, one from each representative district of the city of New Orleans, and one from each senatorial district, with authority to appoint a State executive committee, for the National Reconstruction Party of the State of Louisiana, to form a part of the executive committee when appointed.

And the Chair appointed the following gentlemen:

First Senatorial District—Hon. Cornelius Fellows.

Second Senatorial District—Hon. J. M. Lapeyre.

First Representative District—Hon. L. E. Simonds.

Second Representative District—Hon. N. T. N. Robinson.

Third Representative District—Hon. D. P. Scanlan.

Fourth Representative District—Hon. Newton Richards.

Fifth Representative District: Hon. E. G. Gottschalk.

Sixth Representative District: Hon. Anthony Sumbola.

Seventh Representative District: Hon. Theo. F. Thieneman.

Eighth Representative District: Hon. W. H. Wells.

Ninth Representative District: Hon. C. R. Fagot.

Tenth Representative District: Hon. B. F. Jonas.

Eleventh Representative District: Hon. D. J. Graisser.

On motion of Hon. C. Fellows, Thos. L. Maxwell, Esq., was appointed Secretary of the above committee.

And, on motion of the same gentlemen, the meeting adjourned.
