UNITED STATES INTERNAL REVENUE,
6th Division—2d District of Louisiana.

The following synopsis of the United States Internal Revenue law regarding successions as published for the information of attorneys and other interested parties:

I. PERSONAL PROPERTY. (Sections 111, Act of 1862, and 124, Act of 1864)

1. The United States Internal Revenue Laws of 1862 and 1864, impose a Special Tax upon Legacies and Distributive Shares of Personal Property, (money, notes, movables, &c.)

4. Basis of taxation is the clear valuation of each of personal property.

5. Legacies and Distributive Shares are exempt from taxation in the following cases:

1st. When the whole value of the personal property of the decedent does not exceed one thousand dollars.

2d. All personal property passing from husband or wife to surviving spouse.

3d. By amendment of July 13, 1866, the sum of one thousand dollars in the respective shares of minor children inheriting from parents who have died since August 1, 1866, is exempt from taxation.

6. (Section 125, Act of 1864)

It devolves upon Administrators, Executors, Corators &c. to furnish upon blank form No. 33 a return in duplicate to the assistant assessor, and pay the tax thereon assessed to the collector of Internal Revenue, prior to distributing any such legacies or distributive shares, and they are liable to a penalty of one thousand dollars, to be recovered with costs of suit, for willful neglect or refusal to make such returns, or for furnishing false returns.

II. REAL ESTATE.

1. Taxable only in the successions of persons who have died since June 30, 1864. (Sections 126 to 136, Act of 1864)

RATE OF TAXES.

Lineal issue or ancestor.....One (1) per cent

Brother or sister or descendant of same Two (2) per cent

Uncle or aunt.....Four (4) per cent

Great uncle or great aunt, or descendant of same.....Five (5) per cent

Any other relation or stranger in blood Six (6) per cent

3. Share of widow inheriting from deceased husband is exempt.

4. Surviving husband inheriting from deceased wife is considered stranger in blood (six per cent.)

5. The basis of taxation is the clear valuation of the respective shares, but contingent interests are not allowed to be deducted. If they should afterward become actual, a proportionate amount of the tax will be refunded. (Section 140, Act of 1864)

6. This duty is a lien upon the real estate for five years.

7. Executors, &c. do not make the returns for the real estate of the decedent.

It is the duty of the successors themselves or agents (if minors, their tutors) to furnish to the assistant assessor full returns on blank form No. 34 as soon as placed in possession, and the penalty for a delay of over thirty (30) days, is an increase of ten (10) per cent upon the original tax.

III. Attorneys are respectfully reminded that it devolves upon them having undertaken to conduct all the business of a succession, to instruct Executors, &c. in regard to their duty to make returns before distribution of the shares of personal property, and successors to furnish returns of shares of Real Estate as soon as they shall have become entitled in possession. Not having been notified from this office does not exempt parties from liability to penalty in cases of neglect to make returns.
