BOROUGH ORDINANCE.

AT A MEETING OF THE TOWN COUNCIL of the Borough of Coudersport, held Monday, the 25th day of May, A. D. 1857, it was Ordained: Sec. I.—That Side-walks be made ten feet wide by the owners of Lots on each side of Main Street, from Water Street to the street leading to Crandall Hill.

Sec. II.—That the said Side-walks on Main St. be built of Plank five feet in width, plank to be laid in the center of the side-walk, and graded with gravel on both sides, making in all ten feet.

Sec. III.—That Side-walks be made on each side of East and West Streets, the whole length.

Sec. IV.—The Side-walks on East and West streets to be made of Plank, Gravel, or Flag (at the option of the owner), laid in the same manner as on Main street, except across the Court House Square.

Sec. V.—That Side-walks be made on 1st, 2d, 3d, 4th, 5th, 6th and 7th Streets, on both sides, from East to West street.

Sec. VI.—The Side-walks on said streets to be built of plank, gravel, or flag, (at the option of the owner),—except across the Court House Square—ten feet in width, and when plank is used to be laid in the same manner as on Main Street.

Sec. VII.—The Side-walks around the Court House Square to be built, in all particulars, in the same manner as on Main Street.

Sec. VIII.—The Street Commissioner is hereby ordered to superintend the building of said Side-walks, causing them to be built in accordance with the grade established by the Borough Surveyor, according to the specifications of this Ordinance.

Sec. IX.—The Borough Surveyor is hereby ordered to establish the grade on all streets on which Side-walks are to be built, and set stakes to guide owners of lots in making their side-walks.

Sec. X.—That written or printed notices be given to the owner or owners, or agent of such owner or owners of said lots, to make the side-walks opposite their respective lots.

Sec. XI.—If the said Side-walks are not built on or before the FIRST DAY OF AUGUST, next, then the Town Council shall let the same to the lowest and best bidder, giving at least two weeks' notice in the Potter Journal that Proposals will be received for the building of the said Side-walks in accordance with the provisions of this Ordinance, adding twenty per cent. to the cost of building said side-walks, and to be collected as debts of like amounts are collected by law.

Sec. 12.—That this Ordinance be published six times in the Potter Journal. S. H. STORRS, Clerk of Council. Coudersport, May 25, 1857.—10-1-6t.
