Penn; continued in the "Pennsylvania Archives" up to the present time. These records and archives are very valuable. The Corresponding Secretary also presented a copy of the "Report of Surveys of the line of the proposed Pacific Railroad," which had been sent to him by Hon. Allison White, M. C. for this District. This is also a very valuable work, giving the topography of the country through which the route passes. There are now 350 volumes in the Library, with a prospect of many additions soon.
