**Crowds Outside Tabernacle**

At the evening meeting the tabernacle was packed. It is estimated that nine thousand persons were present. The crowds could not be opened for ventilation. Policemen were on duty, but would have been powerless to keep the multitude in check had opportunity been afforded for entrance into the building.

The evangelist delivered a sermon on "Knockers," reviewing "the troubles of an old fashioned evangelist," Nehemiah. In his reading of the Scripture lesson he brought out the traits of the different characters by inflections of his voice in giving their conversation. The sermon was more powerful than the one delivered in the morning.

**Money Matters Explained**

The Rev. F. T. Cartwright, associate of Dr. Stough, explained at all meetings of the day that the evangelist gets none of the money which is received in the collections, that it is used solely for the ordinary expenses of the campaign. Contributions will be made for the evangelist's benefit at the close of his work in this city.

The large tabernacle chorus, under the energetic leadership of Professor Sponser, of the Stough party, rendered the campaign songs yesterday with great spirit. Familiar hymns were sung so that the audience, which was without books, could join. Books will be sold to-day. They are not sold on Sunday.

On the platform at last night's meeting was the Rt. Rev. James Henry Darlington, bishop of the Harrisburg diocese of the Episcopal church, accompanied by Mrs. Darlington and Miss Eleanor Darlington. The Episcopal churches do not favor the Stough campaign. At the close of the service the bishop greeted Dr. Stough cordially.

**Stop Work on River Dam**

The dam across the river at the lower end of the city was virtually completed Saturday. Several open water gateways, however, remain to be completed, but this work will not be done before next spring, so that water will not be backed up and interfere with the work on the river wall. There are about 150 concrete slabs yet to be placed. When these are put in position water to a depth of about four feet will be backed.
