FRENCH DECLARED TO HAVE ASSUMED THE OFFENSIVE

Paris, Nov. 9.—The French great against the German line has commenced. Unless all signs fail, history will record that in the battle of Flanders, as in the German advance upon Paris, General Joffre waited only until he considered that the German forces had been on the offensive just long enough to batter their strength out against a line that was impregnable, and then ordered a general offensive movement in great strength.

AGENTS OF ENGLISH ARMY SEEK \$2,000,000 SUPPLIES

Philadelphia, Nov. 9.—Agents of Great Britain were making inquiries in this city last week for more than \$2,000,000 worth of supplies for the armies of the allies. Prices were asked, and in some instances options were taken on 20,000 field glasses, 100,000 hair and shaving brushes, 500,000 knives, with can opener attachments, 40,000 saddle blankets and 200,000 mess tins.

GERMAN CRUISER GEIER INTERNED AT HONOLULU

Washington, Nov. 9.—The little German cruiser Geier, which has been repairing at Honolulu while a Japanese squadron waited outside the harbor for her to reappear on the high seas, interned for the war at Honolulu Saturday night, the time set by the American government for her to intern or leave port. Two Japanese cruisers have been stationed off Honolulu for some time on the lookout for the Geier.

SAYS SILESIA IS INVADIED

London, Nov. 9.—The "Times" correspondent at Petrograd, telegraphing yesterday, says that according to private advice the Austro-German armies have left Kalisz and Czeszowa and that Poland is now clear of the enemy. The Russians, the correspondent says, are invading East Prussia and Silesia.

RUSSIAN BLACK SEA FLEET SAILS

Amsterdam, Nov. 9.—The Frankfurter Zeitung learns from Constantinople that the Russian Black Sea fleet Saturday left Sebastopol, proceeding in an easterly direction. Two Turkish submarines cruised in the Aegean Sea, later returning to Constantinople, without having sighted any hostile warships.

CHOLERA SPREADS IN GALICIA

Vienna, Nov. 9.—It is officially announced that there were 256 cases of cholera in Galicia last Thursday. Of these 126 cases were in Przemysl.
