**JUDGE COUNTS MANY LINES**

**Decides Tax Roll Copyist Charged Suffolk County \$11,428 Too Much**  
New York, Nov. 10.—After examining 2,708,957 items of evidence contained in the 1910, 1911 and 1912 tax rolls of Suffolk county, Supreme Court Justice Blackmar of Brooklyn granted judgment of \$11,428 yesterday in favor of the plaintiff in the suit brought by William S. Smith, a taxpayer, to recover excess charges made by Dayton Hedges, a Supervisor of the town of Brookhaven, L. I., who collected \$27,989 for copying written lines of the Suffolk tax rolls for the years mentioned.  
The tax rolls put in evidence comprised seventy volumes of 400 pages each. Justice Blackmar had to count and compare each line of the tax roll. Hedges claimed that under contract he was to be paid one cent for copying each of them. Smith claimed Hedges had counted as lines to be copied the headings of pages in the tax books and items in the recapitulation books.  
The case was tried last July. Since then Justice Blackmar had been going over the books. He directed Hedges to repay \$11,428.

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**URGE A NEW COURT HOUSE**

Scranton, Pa., Nov. 10.—Condemning the present court house as inadequate for the conduct of the public business, the Grand Jury yesterday recommended that either a new court house be built or the present structure enlarged.  
Judge Edwards said that he agreed with the recommendation, and will submit the report to the County Commissioners.  
The report follows a sermon Sunday night at the John Raymond Memorial Universalist church in which the pastor, the Rev. Thomas B. Payne, after having been tied up for more than a week on a murder jury, related his experiences in the uncomfortable court quarters.

**HOE SUITS WITHDRAWN**  
Action Brought by Miss Mae A. Sullivan Stricken From Calendar  
New York, Nov. 10.—Justice Giegeer, in the Supreme Court yesterday, struck from the calendar the two suits brought by Miss Mae A. Sullivan against Arthur L. Hoe. One of the suits was for \$150,000 for alleged breach of promise to marry, and the other, for \$75,000 was based on an alleged promise of Mr. Hoe to pay her \$1,000 a week for life.  
Mirabeau L. Towns withdrew as Miss Sullivan's counsel and Warren McCoubly succeeded him. When no appearance was made, Edward G. Pringle, Mr. Hoe's counsel, made the motion to strike them off.
