Cheltenham, Pa., Nov. 11.—Having wandered Monday and Monday night through the fields and woods of this place, Fox Chase and Rockledge, 12-year-old Margaret Saab, of Myrtle avenue, was found in an empty house yesterday morning and returned to her home.

Margaret started for school, and when she did not return home for lunch her mother became alarmed and made inquiry at the school. There she found that her daughter had not reported. An alarm was sent out and a posse formed to search the surrounding woods. The girl was seen in Jeanes' woods, near Burnholme Park, in the early evening, but almost immediately disappeared and eluded searches. Saab was kept up all night, and early yesterday morning she was found in an empty house six miles from home, suffering from exposure and hunger.

Cheltenham police took her home, where she was placed under the care of a physician.

BRITISH TO RAISE NEW \$500,000,000

Parliament to Consider Obtaining Amount for War Equal to That Already Used

THE RECRUITING PROBLEM IS UP

Compulsory Military Service Will Be Discussed in Session—Question of Pensions and Soldiers' Pay Will Be Raised By Labor Party

London, Nov. 11, 9.15 A. M.—King George opened to-day what probably will prove to be a purely war session of Parliament. No controversial political question will be deliberated, but this does not mean that entire harmony will prevail, for the Cabinet ministers will be asked some pertinent and uncomfortable questions about their conduct of various phases of the war.

The Labor party leaders are especially primed with questions in regard to pay for the soldiers, allowances for their dependants and pensions, but criticism of the government by the opposition probably will be restrained.

Reginald McKenna, the Home Secretary, is expected to make a report on the situation in regard to alien enemies in England and the extent of the spy peril, but no additional legislation in this direction is expected.

The most immediate question before the House of Commons will be to provide means of war in men and money. The recruiting situation may lead to some steps toward compulsory service and the \$500,000,000 granted in August, having been practically spent, a further credit of a like amount will probably be proposed under the special war loan act passed at the last session.

One hundred and five Unionists were missing from their seats, being absent in various capacities in connection with the war, while 32 Ministerialists were actually at the front and many others are absent on government business.

The usual ceremony accompanied the opening of Parliament, the king making a military pageant through the streets to Westminster place, but like the Lord Mayor's show the customary color was lacking. Instead of brilliant-uniformed household guards lining the streets and forming the escort, sober khaki marked the military features of the display.

Within the House of Lords all the usual ceremonial trappings were used. In this body the king's speech from the throne was moved by Lord Methuen and seconded by Viscount Bryce. In the House of Commons the speech was moved by Sir Robert Price and seconded by Commander William Middlebrook.

KAISER RUSHES HORSEMEN TO CHECK THE COSSACKS

London, Nov. 11, 3.59 A. M.—The "Morning Post's" correspondent in North Belgium says that to seize and hold Dunkirk and Calais is believed there to be Emperor William's ardent desire and that it is certain a desperate effort will be made to achieve this accomplishment.

The correspondent adds that he learns from Berlin that eighty trainloads of German cavalry drawn from France and Belgium, have left Berlin for Posen during the last three days.

"This weakening of the German's cavalry," he says, "is due to the fact that the fighting in Flanders is largely confined to the artillery and infantry while cavalry reinforcements are urgently needed to deal with the Cossacks who are advancing with menacing rapidity on the eastern frontier. It is further said that German strategy in Flanders has been the subject of severe criticism at Berlin and that General Von Kluck has been taken to task by the Emperor, although General Von Kluck believed that he had acted throughout as the executant of the imperial orders."


