NEWS OF THE SPORTING WORLD

CENTRAL ELEVEN SHOWS MARKED IMPROVEMENT

Although Unsuccessful They Outplayed Heavier Opponents With But One Regular in the Backfield for Half the Game

The Central High School football eleven showed unexpected strength against the heavier Wilkes-Barre team at Wilkes-Barre Saturday and played the Barons off their feet in more than half of the struggle. The prowess of Bobby Miller alone was responsible for the Wilkes-Barre victory by the score of 9 to 6, he having made a goal from placement in the first period and later scored a touchdown when but five minutes remained to be played.

The great number of followers in this city have taken heart at the improvement of Blue and Grey and Central's chances against Tech on Thursday have been enhanced greatly. With but two regulars in the backfield for the first half of the game and but one regular in the backfield during the last half Central's work against a team that decisively defeated Steelton was remarkable.

Assuming the offensive at the start of the game Central played the Wilkes-Barre team into its own territory being forced back over the center of the field near the close of the first period. When in danger of losing the ball on downs Miller made a goal from placement. Central's advance took the ball to the fifteen-yard line at the close of the period. The next period was Central's beyond a doubt and ground was gained steadily in line plunges and short runs. Smetzer went over for a score through the line. The goal failed. Shortly after Smetzer was knocked unconscious and was forced to retire.

While the Blue and Grey gained ground almost at will in the third period they lacked the power to force the ball over, once having it within eight yards of the Wilkes-Barre goal. The ball seasawed about the center of the field in the final period until Miller got away for a fifty-yard run for a touchdown in final few minutes of play. The kick failed. The lineup and summary:

Curtin Heights Ties Nationals. Curtin Heights tied with the Steelton Nationals Saturday afternoon, the game ending in a score of 12 to 12. DARTMOUTH HAS 359. Leads Opponents in Number of Points Scored—W. and J. Second. Dartmouth is now far in the lead for the high scoring honors among the large college football teams, with a total of 359 points registered in eight games, against 25 for her opponents. Washington and Jefferson is second in the list, with a total of 315 points for nine games, against 39 for her opponents. Dartmouth completed her schedule with Saturday's game against Syracuse, while W. and J. has two games remaining to be played. Tuffs annexes third place, with 264 points. Cornell, though idle on Saturday, is still fourth, with 235. Michigan, also idle, is fifth, with 233. The Army advanced into sixth position, with 199. Pittsburgh follows in seventh place with 194. Harvard passed Yale and is now eighth, with 187. Bucknell is ninth, with 182. Yale, tenth, with 178; the Navy, eleventh, with 174, and Lehigh twelfth, with 167.

THREE VETERANS REMAIN

Mahan, Parson and Wallace, of This Season's Harvard Team, to Form 1915 Nucleus

Cambridge, Mass., Nov. 23.—With the 1914 season closed successfully by the victory over Yale Saturday, Harvard football enthusiasts yesterday surveyed the material for next season. Head Coach Percy D. Haughton, in his eighth year as mentor of the Crimson's football teams and the last one under his present contract, will lose most of the men who worked for Harvard's success at New Haven. Only three of the eleven men who started the game will return to college. Fifteen of the twenty-five players who won their letter will be lost to the team. The crack kicking and running half-back, Edward W. Mahan, is the probable choice of captain to succeed Charles Brickley. Parson, who was impressed from the crew squad to fill left tackle, and Wallace, placed at center late in the season, are the other two regulars remaining. Three members of last year's winning eleven, J. L. Gilman and Ross Cowan, both linemen who have been prevented by faculty restrictions from playing recently, and Soucy, who limped onto the field for a moment Saturday, are expected to be available.

DECREASE ROWING COURSE

Poughkeepsie Route Believed to Be Too Long. By Associated Press.

New York, Nov. 23.—The Intercollegiate Rowing Regatta on the Hudson next June will be held over a 2-mile course and not one of four miles as heretofore, in the opinion of many leading followers of the aquatic sport. With the football season drawing to a close, consideration is being given by the stewards of the Intercollegiate Rowing Association to the question of shortening the Poughkeepsie route, as desired by Cornell. The stewards have not announced their plan, but are said to favor the proposed change. Princeton would be welcome as a contestant on the Hudson in Wisconsin's place and it is said that a Tiger crew might be entered next year if the Hudson course were shortened. Princeton cannot train on Carnegie lake for a 4-mile race, but could do so for a shorter event. Columbia, with Cornell, is said to favor a 3-mile race. Pennsylvania is said to be opposed.
