BRITISH ARMY HAD PART IN RETREAT FROM ANTWERP

London, Dec. 1.—There is one point in Sir John French's dispatch published yesterday upon which the London newspapers failed to comment, although it throws a strong light upon what has been the subject of heated controversy.

Evidently a strong British force assisted in the retreat of the Belgian army from Antwerp, and General Rawlinson, who commanded it, was not under the orders of General French, but of Lord Kitchener, from whom he received his instruction direct.

Yesterday was the fortieth birthday of Mr. Churchill, and the newspapers, except a few of those antagonistic to him, paid a tribute to his remarkable career. The seventieth birthday of the Queen Mother Alexandra is being celebrated to-day.

Philadelphia, Dec. 1.—The Pennsylvania Grand Lodge of Masons has offered its \$12,000 emergency relief fund to alleviate the distress of their brethren in the warring nations of Europe.

U. S. CONTRABAND ORDER APPROVED BY GERMANS; PARTIALITY IS CLAIMED

Berlin, Via London, Dec. 1, 5.21 A. M.—The statement of the American Ambassador, James W. Gerard, regarding contraband is generally reprinted in the German press.

Count Ernest Von Reventlow, in the "Tages Zeitung," finds the American standpoint technically correct, but argues that such shipments whereby only the allies benefit and which constantly strengthen the military effort directed against Germany actually work out in practice as a support of one belligerent to the detriment of another and in a way contrary to the spirit of neutrality.

The statement credited to Ambassador Gerard is undoubtedly the view expressed by the United States in its reply to Germany's protest that England and France were violating the declaration of London with regard to what was contraband.

The reply stated that the United States withdrew its suggestion, made to the belligerent countries, that the declaration of London be adopted as a temporary code of naval warfare in the use of the present war and this was done because of the unwillingness of some of the belligerents to adopt the declaration of London without modification.

The United States government, therefore, the reply went on to say, would insist that its rights and its duties and those of its citizens in the present war be defined by the existing rules of international law and the treaties of the United States with the belligerents.

BACK TO TURKEY AFTER A PROMISE OF 18 YEARS AGO

Berlin, Via The Hague and London, Dec. 1, 7.11 A. M.—The return of Field Marshal Baron Von Der Goltz to Constantinople, according to the "Lokal Anzeiger," is due to a promise made to the Sultan by Von Der Goltz when he left the Turkish service eighteen years ago to return to Turkey ever needed his services.

Lieutenant General Von Oswald, of Wurtemberg, who was taken from the retired list and given command of a landwehr infantry brigade, has been killed in battle in the west.


