Party Lines Shattered on Vote

Party lines were shattered. Democratic Leader Underwood and Republican Leader Mann who led the anti-prohibition forces, were seen fighting shoulder to shoulder in opposition to the resolution. The galleries had been crowded throughout the long contest with spectators whose frequent applause of the speakers made it difficult for Speaker Clark to maintain order.

When the final vote was recorded it showed that 386 members had voted—197 for and 189 against the resolution. The resolution failed of adoption by 61 votes, an affirmative vote of 258 being necessary.

An analysis of the vote shows that of those voting for the resolution 114 were Democrats, 67 Republicans, 12 Progressives and 4 Independent Republicans, making a total of 197. Those voting against the resolution included 141 Democrats, 46 Republicans, 1 Independent Republican and 1 Progressive.

DULL MOVEMENT STILL CONTINUES IN THE MARKET

Majority of Active Issues Unchanged, Or At Least Showing Only Fractions Above and Below Yesterday's Closing Prices in Wall Street

New York, Dec. 23.—(Wall Street).—Early trading in to-day's stock market indicated a continuance of the recent dull and narrow movement. A majority of the active issues were unchanged or at fractions above and below yesterday's closing. Reading was the only stock to move more than a slight fraction, gaining 5/8, which it soon lost. Steel was a trifle lower at the outset, but recovered on dealings which included a block of 1,000 shares. Otherwise the overturn was in small lots and by the end of the first thirty minutes business fell away to minor proportions with a lower trend.

Apart from the record-breaking dullness—sales in the first hour amounting to little more than 20,000 shares—the market was featureless through the morning. St. Paul, Reading and Rock Island sold under yesterday's low prices, likewise Amalgamated and a few of the cheaper copper stocks. Bethlehem Steel lost 3 points of its recent advance and New Haven fell back a point. Numerous sales of steel were effective at 48 1/2, yesterday's low, but attempts to break through that quotation were unavailing until just before noon when the price fell to 48 1/2.

The features of the bond group were two point declines in Washab 4s and Minneapolis and St. Louis 4s.

ALLIES REPORT SLIGHT PROGRESS ALONG LINES IN NORTHERN FRANCE WAR

Paris, Dec. 23, 2:25 P. M.—The announcement given out by the French war office this afternoon reports slight progress on the northern end of the allies' line in France and Belgium. Fog caused a slackening of the fighting near Arras. Advances are claimed near Poitelles-Harlus, where German machine guns were captured and progress or the driving back of counter attacks is reported near Beausjour and in the forest of La Grurie. Near Boureuilles, however, the French apparently lost to the Germans. The text of the communication follows:

"Yesterday in Belgium, we made slight progress between the sea and the highway from Niepoort to Westende, as well as in the region between Steenstrawe and Bixshoote, where we occupied a forest, some houses and a redoubt.

"To the east of Bethune, working in conjunction with the British army, we recaptured the village of Givenchy-Labassee, which had been lost to us.

"In the region of Arras a heavy fog made it necessary for both the enemy and ourselves to lessen our activities.

"To the east of Amiens on the Aiene, and in Champagne, there have been artillery engagements.

"In the region of Perthes-Les-Hurlus, we carried, after a spirited exchange and two assaults, the last section of the line which we occupied in part December 21. We made an average gain of 800 yards. In the last trench which came into our possession, we captured a section of machine guns, including the gun crews. A violent counter attack was repulsed.

"We also made progress to the northeast of Beaujeur, where further counter attacks on the part of the enemy were without success.

"There has been a perceptible advance on the part of our troops in the forest of La Grurie against a front of trenches 400 yards wide and running not less than 250 yards deep. We blew up with mines two of these German lines of works and occupied the excavations.

"The fighting is going on in the vicinity of Bourouilles, with the outcome fairly serious. It would appear not to have been possible to retain entirely the positions acquired yesterday morning.

"There has been no incident from the heights of the Meuse to Upper Alsace.

"Russia: In East Prussia the German have been driven back on the line from Neidenburg to Soldau to Lautenburg. In Poland the Germans were successful in getting a footing on the lower Buzura, to the north of Sochaczew. Further to the south they reached the Rawka river at Bolimow and they have passed Skiernewice moving to the east.

"Austro-German forces are moving into Poland along a front which runs from the point to the southeast of Piotrkow to the west of the river Nida, in Galicia. They have reached the river Dunajek, and they occupy a line from Orybow to Smigrod to Senok.

"The effort at a sortie made by the Przemysl garrison resulted in complete failure."
