STOUGH CHURCHES TO REOPEN  
FOR INCREASED ACTIVITIES

Ministers Will Baptize  
and Receive Into Fel-  
lowship Converts of  
Campaign

CHOIRS TO GIVE  
SPECIAL MUSIC

Moving Pictures Will Be Shown at  
Christ Lutheran and Fifth Street  
Methodist—Gathering at Redeem-  
er Lutheran of Members Received

Churches of the city which co-op-  
erated in the Stough campaign and  
were closed partially or entirely during  
the seven weeks of the tabernacle meet-  
ings, will to-morrow reopen and pre-  
pare for increased activities, while in  
many churches of the different denom-  
inations Christmas sermons and Chris-  
mas music will be features of the day's  
services.  
In the Stough co-operating churches  
there will be baptism and reception into  
church fellowship of men, women and  
children who hit the trail at the taber-  
nacle during the campaign. There will  
be informal receptions for the converts,  
in addition to the introductions into  
church membership. In several of the  
churches there will be communion ser-  
vices, and in many the services in the  
evening will be of an evangelistic na-  
ture. Extensive revivals, in the wake  
of the Stough campaign, are being  
planned, in which the Stough song  
books will be used largely.

Sunday School Rallies

The Sunday schools of the co-operat-  
ing churches, which had been held at  
morning hours during the campaign,  
have been restored to afternoon hours.  
In many Sunday schools there will be  
rallies and the services will be of a  
special nature.

Ministers of the co-operating church-  
es will in some instances preach to  
trail hitters and in other cases to per-  
sons who have not hit the trail, and  
calls will be made for converts.

Moving Pictures at Fifth Street

Not wishing to interfere with the  
last Sunday of the Stough evangelistic  
campaign, the Fifth Street Methodist  
church did not observe the usual Chris-  
mas Sunday program. As a substitute  
for the Christmas Sunday program  
will be rendered this Sunday. A num-  
ber of Christmas autheas have been  
prepared by the choir. In the place of  
a sermon there will be something new  
in the way of a Sunday evening ser-  
vice, in the form of a motion picture en-  
titled, "And There Was Light." These  
pictures have been pronounced by ex-

that have yet been produced in this  
line of work. They are reverential in

evangelistic services. At the morning  
service a number of the converts will  
be received in the church on probation  
and classes for religious instruction will  
be formed. These classes will be under  
the direct supervision of the pastor. To  
further enlarge the scope of the re-  
ligious interest now manifested in Har-  
risburg, special evangelistic services will  
be held in this church Wednesday and  
Sunday evenings. A large chorus choir  
has been organized, and this choir will  
be supported by an orchestra of a dozen  
pieces. These special services will con-  
tinue indefinitely. The Sunday school  
will meet in its regular session at 2  
o'clock, and since the beginning of  
the Stough meetings.
