

#### YALE'S FOOTBALL DATES.


Elis Will Play Only One Game Outside Bowl Next Fall

College will take the place of Notre Dame. With the exception of the annual contest with Harvard, which will be played at Cambridge, all the games will be played in the Bowl.

## NEWS OF THE SPORTING WORLD

### PAID COACHES IN ATHLETICS

President Hibben, of Princeton, in Annual Report Expresses Hope They Will Soon Disappear

Princeton, N. J., Jan. 15.—President John Grier Hibben, of Princeton University, in his annual report presented to the trustees yesterday, expressed the hope that paid coaches in athletics would soon disappear. Athletics are suffering from an over-organized system of coaching, he said, and he believed that more responsibility should be placed on team captains.

If under graduates should be released from "unnatural domination of their sport by graduate coaches," he said, "intercollegiate sport would be liberated from the abnormal incubus of a super-imposed system which tends to make puppets of the players."

President Hibben in the report said: "Our athletics, not only in Princeton, but throughout the country, are suffering from an over-organized system of coaching. I hope that the time may soon come when the paid coach will disappear. He and his over-increasing number of assistants, all of whose expenses prove a heavy drain upon the athletic treasurer and tend to keep up the gate receipts of intercollegiate contests at an abnormal figure, render intercollegiate sport an unduly expensive affair."

"Particularly in the game of football, the captain of the team should be the sole responsible person for the management of his men, devising and directing their play in practice games so that in the critical situations of a great contest he and his team will rise to the occasion and win or lose with honor."

"It is quite absurd, when one comes to think of it, that the control of the team in all preliminary games should be in the hands of a body of men who are relegated to the side lines when the play is on. After all it is an undergraduate affair and the game should be planned and played by undergraduates. If you place upon them the responsibility, they will respond to it, for it is certain that responsibility always provokes efficiency. That men may be successful in time of emergency, they must be schooled in the art of resourcefulness by some stimulation of their latent powers of ingenuity."

"We release our undergraduates from the unnatural domination of their sports by graduate coaches and from the confusion of many minds and voices in the direction of their activities. We will simplify the whole athletic situation and liberate intercollegiate sport from the abnormal incubus of a super-imposed system which tends to make puppets of the players, limiting the spontaneity and free play of their natural initiative."

### DOOIN AGREES TO BE A RED

Baker Convinces Him It's to His Interest to Stay in Organized Ball

Philadelphia, Jan. 15.—Charley Dooin will catch for the Cincinnati Reds next season. The maskman and President Baker, of the Phillies, had a long conference yesterday afternoon and at the finish Dooin concluded it would be to his interest to go to Cincinnati, which offers him \$6,000 a season for two years. This makes Dooin one of the highest salaried catchers in the country.

President Baker called Manager Herzog of the Cincinnati club on long distance phone at his farm near Ridge-

ley, Maryland, and told him that Dooin had reconsidered his refusal of early in the week and had decided to go to Cincinnati. Dooin then took the receiver and had a brief conversation with Herzog, in which he declared that he would be glad to play in the city of his nativity, and would do everything possible to make a winner out of Cincinnati next season.

After the conference Dooin was asked whether or not he would go to Chicago to testify at the trust hearing. "No, I won't find it convenient," he said, "because I have too much personal business on my hands just now. The Chicago trip is off for good."

Origin of Gibraltar

### ALL TO FILE AFFIDAVITS

Owners in Big Leagues Boost Organized Baseball in Coming Federal Suit

Chicago, Jan. 15.—Every club owner in the American and National League the presidents of the leagues and some minor league club owners will file affidavits giving the side of organized baseball in the Federal League's Anti-Trust suit next week. B. B. Johnson, president of the American League; August Herrmann, of the Cincinnati Nationals and chairman of the National Commission, and President Charles Thomas, of the Chicago Nationals, already had prepared affidavits and C. A. Comiskey, of the Chicago Americans, and Robert Hedges, of the St. Louis Americans, questioned by attorneys for organized ball here, gave their testimony.

The text of the affidavits were not made public, but in a general way they are said to contain statements declaring that baseball under the National agreement is not a trust; that it has proved a blessing to ball players and denying the Federals' charges. Ball players themselves will not be asked to testify on the side of organized baseball.

Speedy determination of the injunction proceedings instituted by the Federal League to prevent organized baseball from interfering with its operations and players is expected when the case is opened here next Wednesday before Judge Landis in the United States district court.

Officials of the Federal and leaders of the organized forces are agreed on this point. Both sides expressed the opinion that the case will be decided in ample time to allow the clubs of the three leagues to start their spring training trips without any danger that a court verdict may disarrange plans for the championship season.

August Herrmann, chairman of the National commission, held a conference with attorneys for organized baseball yesterday, at which work of framing a defense for the charges brought by the Federals was continued. Herrmann planned to return to Cincinnati to-day, but will be back on Monday for a final conference with John K. Tener, president of the National League, in regard to the plans of defense. John A. Heydler, secretary of the Nationals, who has been aiding Herrmann, returned east last night.
