DETECTIVES WHO FOILED ANARCHISTS' PLOT AND EXPLOSIVE EXPERT HOLDING TWO OF THE BOMBS

A plot for the wholesale destruction of property and the assassination of John D. Rockefeller, Andrew Carnegie, Cornelius Vanderbilt and others of New York city's prominent men was frustrated when detectives foiled an attempt of two anarchists to blow up St. Patrick's Cathedral, in Fifth avenue. This was to be the first blow in the widespread campaign. There were hundreds of persons in the Cathedral when the bomb, with fuse sputtering, was cast into the aisle just in front of the altar. A melodramatic phase in the arrest of the plotters was the disguise used by the detectives who were assigned to the Cathedral. Two of them were garbed as scrubwomen and another as an elderly usher.
