DEATH SENTENCE STANDS FOR TWO MURDERERS

Pardons Board Refuses to Grant Commutation to Life Imprisonment for March and Louisa—Dauphin Case Is Held Under Adjudication

The Board of Pardons closed its executive session last night after hearing argument on a long list of cases. The case of David Kauffman, convicted in the Dauphin county court of slaying a man and short-changing Harrisburg merchants, for which he is serving a term in the penitentiary, was held under advisement and will not be disposed of until some future meeting of the Board. Commutation of the death sentence was denied in the case of George H. March, Delaware, and Mike Louisa, Schuylkill. The decisions announced were as follows: Refused—C. H. A.
