The News Condensed.

New York hotels are thronged with merchants who have gone there to make their Spring purchases.

Grant managers at Washington express surprise and annoyance that Mr. Blaine has the support of Rhode Island.

The Connecticut Senate has refused to give women the right of suffrage on the license question.

The negroes of Arkansas are going in large numbers to the negro republic of Liberia.

President Agnell, of Michigan University, is mentioned as a possible candidate for the mission to China.

Miss Louisa Alcott's name heads the list of women who have the right to vote for School Committee in Concord, this Spring.

Cardinal McClosky Friday administered the right of confirmation to a class of about 700 persons at St. Peter's Church New York.

There is a general strike of railroad men, miners and machinists in St. Louis; but there is a disposition to accede to their demands.

This week is called Passion Week or Holy Week in the Episcopal and Catholic churches. In the latter churches the pictures and ornaments are hidden with purple covering.

Scandal-mongers are enjoying a rich feast just at this time. The charges against Senator Ben Hill of Georgia, and the reported difficulty and separation of ex-Senator Christiancy and wife, are rich morsels for the sensational press and gossip readers.

A canvass of a single room in the Treasury Department disclosed the fact that among the clerks therein there were ten Grant men, three Blaine men, and only two Sherman men. The Grant and Blaine men were outspoken in expressing their preference.

The Indian chiefs of the Tte Nation now in Washington will not leave for Colorado until the Indian Committee has finished examining them. They will all be sent back together excepting those who are found to have been engaged in the Meeker massacre.

The Smithsonian Institute has received from Prof. Peters, of Clinton the announcement of the discovery by himself, on the 18th of March, 1880, of a planet of the twelfth magnitude, in 11 hours 25 min. 20 sec., right ascension, 1 deg. 2 min. south declention, with a daily motion of 7 min. North,

The Minority report of the House Committee on the Cause of the Depression of Labor, concludes that whatever causes may have existed for the appointment of the committee originally, none exist at this time requiring its further investigations; that prosperity abounds everywhere, and labor can secure employment at a fair compensation.

In his dispatch from London, the correspondent of the *Tribune*, gives the latest phases of the electoral campaign, which now occupies the attention of the United Kingdom. Mr. Gladstone is awakening great enthusiasm in Scotland, and his speeches are regarded as sounding the keynote of the campaign. The Liberals have nominated his son Herbert for Middlesex, and agreed to pay his election expenses.
