CHILD PERISHED IN FLAMES. Fire caused the loss of one life and the destruction of two houses at Sandy Run, near Hopewell, Bedford county, last Wednesday night. One of the structures was a double house, occupied by the families of James Ross and Ephraim Mellott, the latter formerly residing in this county. Ross was away from home. His son, who is a cripple was first to be awakened by the heat and smoke and he snatched up two of his sisters and shouted to the others in the house to jump from the windows. One child, a girl 7 years old, had to be left behind and she perished. All possible efforts were made to get to her, but to no avail. Her cries for help could be plainly heard, but the heat and flames drove the rescuers back as each successive attempt was made to reach her. The charred remains of the child were found in the ashes the next morning.
