In addition to the great damage done to property in Johnstown and adjoining boroughs the loss sustained by the Pennsylvania Railroad was the severest blow they had ever yet sustained. Five thousand workmen have been employed day and night to repair the tracks and put the road-bed in condition again. The loss of rolling stock, including thirty engines and hundreds of freight cars was also very great.


