UNIVERSITY at Lewisburg.

THE TRUSTEES of the University at Lewisburg respectfully inform its Patrons and Friends, that, in the School under their care, (at Lewisburg) the following are the Classes, Subjects of Study and Exercises for the current year.

Departments and Studies.

PRIMARY DEPARTMENT.

Six Classes—Exercise in Spelling, Reading, Definition, English Grammar, Arithmetic, Geography, History U. S. A., Penmanship, and Composition.

ENGLISH DEPARTMENT of the Academy.

The same studies as in the Primary Department continued in the use of larger text books; and to these are added General History, Davies' Algebra, Legendre and Surveying.

CLASSICAL DEPARTMENT of the Academy.

Jun. Academic Class. Latin Language, Geography, History U. S. A., Latin Grammar and Reader, Greek Grammar and Reader commenced, Arithmetic completed.

Sen. Academic Class. English Language, General History, Caesar, Virgil, Greek Reader, Davies' Algebra.

COLLEGIATE DEPARTMENT.

Freshman Class. Latin, Analysis, Memorabilia, Davies' Legendre, Trigonometry, Euclid, Spherics, Conics, Horace, Ovid, Virgil, Select Orations of Demosthenes, Legendre completed, Davies' Surveying and Navigation, Analytical Geometry, Blair's Lectures.

Junior Class. Demosthenes on the Crown, Greek Tragedy, Cicero de Officiis, Tacitus, Natural Philosophy, Astronomy, Logic.

Students in the English Department recite with them, preparing the same studies in the Regular Course.

No class in the Regular course, has less than three daily recitations. All the members of the school, (in three divisions,) are exercised every Saturday in Reading, Declamation, English Composition, and Vocal Music.

All the students are required to attend, regularly, in classes termed as follows: Minors are expected to attend all meetings as are recommended to them by their parents or guardians. There are in the Borough no less than six places of public worship, occupied every Lord's Day by as many different Christian denominations.

Number of Students.

The number of students during the past year in the various departments, was 163. The number that have entered the classes in the Regular Course for the current year (exclusive of those in the English and Primary departments) is as follows:

College—Junior class - 6

Senior class - 13

Freshman class - 18

Academy—Senior class - 12

Junior class - 28-71

STEPHEN W. TAYLOR, A. M., Professor of Mathematics and Natural Philosophy;

GEORGE R. BLISS, A. M., Professor of Greek Language and Literature;

GEORGE W. ANDERSON, A. M., Professor of Latin Language and Literature;

ISAAC N. LOOMIS, A. M., Principal of the Academy.

ALFRED TAYLOR, A. M., Teacher in the Academy.

In order to meet the demands of the Institution, the Board have taken measures to supply the necessary Apparatus for the department of Mechanical Philosophy, and to increase the Library, before the commencement of the winter session. During the year, the building now in progress will be completed, affording study rooms and dormitories for 70 college students. Another Professor has been added to the Faculty, and means provided to enable students in the classes specified above to prosecute their studies with the greatest success.

Tuition and Board.

TUITION in the Collegiate Department \$30, Academic \$20, Primary \$12—per year. BOARD, including lodging, washing, fuel and light, can be had in the village and its vicinity at various prices, from \$1,37 1/2 to \$2,50 per week.

Sessions, Vacations, &c.

Two Sessions in a year—the former commences on the second Tuesday in October, and continues 27 weeks; the latter continues 15 weeks. Spring Vacation, 4 weeks; Autumnal, 6. Next session begins 11th October.

The Board are happy to add that Lewisburg is at present, as it ever has been, exceedingly healthy.
