MISCELLANEOUS IRISH NEWS.

ANTRIM.—Mr. John Little, J. P., has declined being a candidate for the Parliamentary representation of Belfast in the Tory interest.

CARLOW.—The Right Rev. Dr. Walsh, Lord Bishop of Kildare and Leighlin, has sanctioned the candidature of Captain Fagan for Carlow, and offers him his support.

CLARE.—A testimonial is about being presented to Mr. Wainright Crowe, J. P., Cahencalla, Ennis, Lord Leconfield's agent, for his exertions on behalf of the people of Ennis in procuring for them a large and commodious fair green in Ennis.

During the month of July the town of Kilkree has been crowded by visitors from all parts of the island, who deem it one of the most fashionable watering places now in vogue.

CORK.—The Cork Examiner says: On Sunday, the 26th ult., during the celebration of mass at Queenstown Chapel, a most extraordinary scene took place. The Rev. Mr. Dennehy was celebrant, and at the elevation a man named Cotter, who, we understand is a coal porter, rushed from the body of the church, springing over the railings, and just as the priest was elevating the sacred host, the man seized him around the body. The greatest excitement prevailed in the chapel for some time, the congregation being unable to see any cause for so extraordinary a proceeding. An alarm of fire was given, many ladies fainted, and the greater portion of the congregation, rushed for the doors, while some persons seized Cotter, who appeared to be laboring under the most intense excitement. In the absence of any explanation from Cotter, indignation ran very high against him, and only for his arrest by constable Ryan, he would have been roughly handled. Mass was for a few moments interrupted, but the man being removed, tranquillity was restored, and the sacrifice concluded without further interruption.

DUBLIN.—The United States ironclad screw corvette Canandaigua, Captain J. H. Strong, one of Admiral Farragut's squadron, arrived at Kingstown on the 25th ult. On the following day she was visited by hundreds of the Dublin people, who seemed vastly pleased with her.

The Nation says: A very fine stone cross has been erected in the garden opposite the little chapel situated at St. James Terrace, Dolphin's barn (the chapel of Ease to the parish church of St. James street.) The cross, which is a very fine specimen of the ancient Irish cross, stands eleven feet high (including the pedestal or base, which is two feet) and has been purchased by the contributions of a few of the generous and pious parishioners of Dolphin's barn at a cost of some forty pounds and upward, and presented to the Rev. Mr. Walsh, their good priest, in whose garden it has already been erected.

The Liberal members of the Dublin corporation have determined if possible to prevent the election of Mr. James Vokes Mackey as lord mayor for next year. With that view they have had a special meeting called for the rescinding of the vote by which Mackey was nominated. All this is because of Mr. Mackey's ascendancy principles.

A public testimonial is about being presented to Mr. Alexander M. Sullivan, editor and proprietor of the Nation and Weekly News, by his admirers from all parts of the island.

GALWAY.—The Thom Herald says that the quiet village of Muscield, in the parish of Milltown, was recently the scene of an interesting demonstration, occasioned by a visit paid to the home of his youth by Mr. John C. Duggan, who is at present sojourning in that country, after an absence of nearly twenty years in the State of Georgia, United States.

KILDARE.—A Naas correspondence dated 22d ult., says of the local crops: The turnip crop, generally speaking, is not as good as last season, except in very rich land. As to hay, there is a very plentiful supply to be disposed of, but that is not the case, except where the land had been kept up since February. The potato crop is particularly favored this year, and there is a most prolific return. The wheat crop has not been so good for a number of years, and has an average yield of straw.

The interesting ceremony of the reception of a nun took place at the convent of Mercy, Athlone, on the 13th ult. The young lady who devoted herself to the service of God in religion, was Miss Christina O'Hara, daughter of the late Mr. Thomas O'Hara, of that city, and previously of Ballitore, county Kildare.

KILKENNY.—A correspondent under date of the 25th ult., says: The boisterous wind which blew this morning from the southwest was the precursor of very heavy rain, which commenced at ten o'clock, and as we write, shows no signs of abatement. The cereal crops, wheat and oats, the greater portion of which in this district is now thoroughly ripe, will, it is to be feared, be much injured, but it will infuse new life into potatoes, turnips, mangolds, and all green crops.

KING'S COUNTY.—Mr. David Sherlock, Q. C., has issued his address to the electors of King's County. He is distinct in the declaration of his principles. He says: "I am prepared to support the most liberal measure of tenant right that a reformed Parliament can be induced to concede. On the Church question I shall only rest satisfied when perfect equality amongst all religious denominations in Ireland shall have been established. I shall support entire

freedom of religious education. I shall vote for the ballot, believing it to be necessary for the protection of the humble but honest elector. These measures shall have my support, totally irrespective of persons or of parties."

LIMERICK.—It is said that Rev. Hercules Dickinson, of St. Anne's, Dublin, has been appointed Protestant Dean of Limerick.

Martin Hogan, Michael Ryan, and John Molony were recently summoned by the Bruff police for "singing a seditious song" at Knockany, on their way to Bruff, in which were the words, "We will never, never give up Ireland without another blow." The magistrates, after a lengthened inquiry, ordered the accused to give bail, themselves in £20 each, and two sureties of £10 each.

The Dublin Irishman says: Information is wanted of Maria O'Farrell, who emigrated in November, 1852, from Limerick to New York. Any information respecting her will be thankfully received by her sister, Anne O'Leary, in care of Mr. Kennedy Ambrose, North Strand, Limerick.

LONGFORD.—A correspondent of the Dublin Freeman says: The people of Drumard are in deep mourning for the loss of their good pastor, the Rev. J. Dolan. He died on the 25th ult., after an illness of two months. He was sixty years old, thirty-four of which he spent in the sacred ministry. But his life deserves to be measured by a nobler line than that of years. His was a long and successful missionary career. After a distinguished course of studies in the Irish College, Paris, the Most Rev. Dr. Higgins took him to himself as chaplain. He was afterward removed to Kingh, where he gave proofs of extraordinary energy and zeal. On account of these good qualities he was subsequently transferred to Drumard, one of the most arduous missions in the diocese of Armagh.

LOUTH.—In reference to the Parliamentary representation of Dundalk, a correspondent of the Irish Times says: It is said that R. Haig, Esq., J. P., of the Dundalk distillery, will offer himself for election in the Conservative interest. It is also rumored that Captain Sir Leopold McIntock, R.N., would contest the constituency, but this requires confirmation, as this distinguished discoverer is away on a voyage.

MAYO.—The Mayo Constitution says Lord Bingham will personally canvass his friends and supporters in Mayo early in August. Lord John Browne's farewell address to the electors is also published in the Constitution. George Henry Moore will be the Liberal candidate.

The Chief Baron, in addressing the grand jury for the county Mayo, congratulated them on the peaceful state of the county—there being but five actual offenses reported since last assizes.

The Very Rev. Dr. Turner, Vicar-General of the diocese of Brooklyn, United States, en route for Rome, recently arrived at St. Mary's, Headford, and has taken up his quarters in the apartments just finished by the Rev. P. Conway, P.P., for the especial use of any American ecclesiastic who may visit the West.

MEATH.—Mark Colgan, Esq., of Castle-richard, Entfield, has been appointed to the commission of the peace for the county of Meath, on the recommendation of the Earl of Fingall, lord lieutenant of the county.

QUEEN'S COUNTY.—At a late Abbeyleix petty sessions some sixty persons were summoned for unlawfully assembling and parading about the town during the night of the 11th ult. and the morning of the 12th. Six magistrates were present. It was fully established in evidence that the cause of the assembly of the people on the morning in question was a widespread and accredited rumor that an Orange flag was to be hoisted on the 12th ult., upon the courthouse of Abbeyleix, and the object of the persons so assembled was simply and merely to protect the Presentation Convent and the nuns as well as the Catholic church from supposed or possible outrage.

TIPPERARY.—The Limerick Reporter says: The Rev. P. Kennedy, the excellent parish priest of Roscrea, announces the conversion of Henry White, Esq., J. P., of Charleville House, to the Catholic Faith. WATERFORD.—A Waterford correspondent, under date 23d ult., thus speaks of the weather and the crops: The benefits which have arisen from the late fall of rain cannot be overrated to the farmers. In some places previous to it the wheat, oats, and turnip crops would hardly be recognized as such by an agriculturist's eye, so dried up and yellow did they appear, but since the rain vegetation has set in, and very small doubt is manifested that every species of crop will be revived by its healthful influence.

WESTMEATH.—The Cork Examiner says: A few minutes before the House of Commons was summoned to hear the Queen's speech, Mr. Reardon produced the most portentous piece of legislation he has yet attempted. It was nothing less than a bill for the repeal of the Union and the re-establishment of the federal connection between Great Britain and Ireland which existed previous to the year 1800. The honorable member was unable to find a second for the measure.

CHARTER OF THE NEW ORLEANS CATHOLIC PUBLICATION COMPANY. STATE OF LOUISIANA, Parish of Orleans, City of New Orleans.

BE IT KNOWN THAT ON THIS DAY of the month of August, 1868, of the Independence of the United States of America the ninety-second, before me, Wm. Joseph Castell, Notary Public in and for the Parish of Orleans, State of Louisiana, duly commissioned and qualified, and in the presence of the witnesses hereinafter named and undersigned, personally came and appeared, the parties hereinafter named and undersigned, who declare that, availing themselves in full of the provisions of the statutes of Louisiana relative to the organization of corporations, they do, by these presents form themselves into and constitute a corporation for the following specified objects and under the following stipulations to-wit:

ARTICLE I. The official name of the corporation shall be the New Orleans Catholic Publication Company.

ARTICLE II. The business and legal domicile of the corporation shall be in the City of New Orleans, subject to removal only by a vote of three-fourths of the bona fide stockholders with the consent of the President of the Corporation.

ARTICLE III. The object of this company is to publish a newspaper in the City of New Orleans and make such other publications as may be deemed advisable by the Board of Directors.

ARTICLE IV. The Vice President of the Company is the officer on whom, as such, citations may be served, and in whose name suit will be brought.

ARTICLE V. The Capital Stock of the Corporation is fixed at One Hundred Thousand Dollars in Five Thousand Shares of Twenty Dollars each, one half of each subscription to be paid at the time of signing and the remainder whenever called in by the Board of Directors at any time after sixty days shall have elapsed from the recording of the act of incorporation, provided said remainder may be paid at any time, voluntarily by the stockholder, without any call of the Board, entitling him to a proportional dividend.

ARTICLE VI. This Corporation shall commence operations as soon as Two Hundred Shares of the Capital Stock is subscribed, and immediately thereafter the Stockholders may meet and elect a Board of Directors, consisting of five Directors, each share of stock subscribed shall be entitled to one vote. Stockholders may vote in person or by proxy of another stockholder.

ARTICLE VII. In case it should become necessary to place this corporation in liquidation, there shall be appointed by the Board of Directors, some one of their number who shall represent them, and whose signature shall be binding on the Company, in such capacity.

ARTICLE VIII. No stockholder will be held responsible for any liability of the Company beyond the amount of his stock.

ARTICLE IX. There shall be no sale of stock without consent of the Board, and no transfer of stock will be recognized unless approved by the Board.

ARTICLE X. The First President of the Board of Directors shall be the Most Rev. Jean Marie Odin.

ARTICLE XI. The Board of Directors shall consist of, besides the President, five members who shall be Clergymen, and who shall be named by the President, and second, three other members to be elected by the stockholders.

ARTICLE XII. The Directors of the first class shall be appointed and removed by the President, and their places filled with others appointed by him, as frequently as he shall see fit, without any responsibility in anywise, on his part to the stockholders, or any objection to their appointment. The object of this article is to secure in the hands of the President, the complete control of the newspaper and of the general business of the corporation whenever he may see fit to exercise it.

ARTICLE XIII. The three Directors of the second class shall be elected by the stockholders, at an election to be held annually in the month of December, after the first election, on such day as may be appointed by the Board of Directors, whereof due notice shall be given in the newspaper of the company. At this election each share of stock shall be entitled to one vote, the majority of votes shall elect. In case of a vacancy occurring during the year, the place shall be filled by vote of the remaining Directors of this class. The Vice President to decide in case of a tie vote.

ARTICLE XIV. This annual election of three Directors shall be the only mode in which stockholders, as such, may claim an influence in the control of the paper or the affairs of the corporation.

ARTICLE XV. No member of the Board of Directors shall receive any part of the profits of the paper, nor shall he be entitled to employment in the paper for which he will receive any compensation.

ARTICLE XVI. The President shall hold his office until his death or voluntary resignation.

ARTICLE XVII. Upon a vacancy in the office of President occurring in either of these two articles, his successor shall be elected by the Directors of the first class, or as many of them as may then be in office. During any absence or incapacity of the President, his place shall be filled by such one of the three Directors of the first class as he shall appoint Vice President.

ARTICLE XVIII. The Board of Directors shall have entire control of the business of the Company. They shall appoint editors and employers of the paper, and shall regulate the frequency and time of publication of the paper. They shall have the power to buy material and make all arrangements for the conduct of the business, such as contracts for advertising or shares upon which any installment may be made whenever desirable, and declare dividends of profit, if any.

ARTICLE XIX. This act may be amended by a vote of the stockholders. To effect this there must be cast in favor of said amendment two-thirds of all the votes entitled to be cast, each share representing one vote. Said amendments must have been proposed by the Board of Directors and approved by the President.

ARTICLE XX. The term for which this Corporation is formed shall be twenty-five years.

ARTICLE XXI. Should any stockholder refuse or neglect to pay annually his or her installment as the same falls due, in the rate of eight per cent per annum, shall be added thereto from maturity until payment, and if any stockholder refuses, or neglects to pay his or her installment within thirty days after the specified time of payment, the Board of Directors shall have the right of causing the share or shares upon which any installment may be due to be sold at auction or otherwise, as the Board may deem advisable.
