MISCELLANEOUS IRISH NEWS. IRISH NEWS AND THE WAR.—Eager speculations on the incidents and result of the Franco-Prussian war occupy the Irish newspapers of latest date, almost to the exclusion of everything else.

Popular Demonstration.—A popular demonstration on a very large scale took place on Monday, August 15th, which was supported by many of those who took part in it to be in celebration of a French victory over the Prussians, of sufficient magnitude to reverse the effect of the recent successes of the latter.

At about eight o'clock the various trade bands of the day converged towards Upper Dominick street, each attended by a large crowd, and one by a number of men and boys bearing lighted torches, the effect of which was very much diminished by the fact that darkness had not completely set in.

At about a quarter of ten o'clock the lights were drawn, and this was a signal for all the lights exhibited in the other houses being extinguished.

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The report that the illustrious Archbishop of Tuam had arrived in town from Rome was generally diffused through the city on Saturday last, and created the greatest possible interest amongst the patriotic citizens of Dublin.
