CITY INTELLIGENCE.

On Wednesday afternoon last the banking house of Pike, Brother & Co. was robbed of a bank box, the property of Messrs. Nalle & Cammack.

Thursday morning, about 7 o'clock, the porter of Mr. Kruttschnitt (German Consul) 49 Ferrido street, while cleaning the gallery of the office, observed a package of papers in a large cart standing in front of Phelps, Parke & Co.'s wagon repository.

On Thursday morning last, about 10 o'clock, dray number 1363 collided with Levee street car, number 138, at the corner of Old Levee and Madison streets, causing the explosion of sixteen cases of torpedoes, the entire load of the dray.

The driver of the dray, Timothy O'Connell, was killed. Jacques Coulog, driver of dray number 2800 was severely wounded, and, it is feared, will not recover.

St. John's Church, on Dryades street, (Rev. J. Moynihan) is being pushed to completion with all the energy, so characteristic of its beloved pastor.

A fair for the benefit of the Church of Notre Dame du Sacre Coeur, is now being held in Blaffer's Building. It deserves success and will doubtless attain it.

On October 28th, a fair for the benefit of St. Francis' School, corner Second and St. David streets, will commence and continue throughout the week.

Early next month a fair for the benefit of St. John's Church (Dryades street) will be held in Masonic Hall. A pleasing incident at this fair will be the balloting for a gold-headed cane to be awarded to the clergyman receiving the highest number of votes.

Among the events of the past week may be noted the arrival, in St. Patrick's Parish, of six Sisters of Mercy, who come to take charge of the parochial schools of St. Patrick's Church.

Later accounts confirm previous disastrous reports from the Northwest. The loss of life in the neighborhood of Peshtigo will reach twelve hundred. Fifteen per cent of those injured die.

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TELEGRAPHIC SUMMARY.

WASHINGTON.—On the 17th the President issued his proclamation suspending the writ of Habeas Corpus in the nine counties in South Carolina mentioned in last Sunday's Star.

NEW YORK.—The dry goods merchants are advancing prices on account of the Chicago fire. Eighty-six thousand dollars worth of yonkers have been found that were paid on account of Keyser, and which Keyser pronounced forgeries.

PENNSYLVANIA.—In view of the result of the recent elections in Pennsylvania and Ohio, the Pittsburg Post has come out for Thomas A. Scott for President, and the vote to carry Pennsylvania against Grant by an overwhelming majority.

CHICAGO.—Every day brings fresh occasion for encouragement. The city is orderly, and relief for the poor comes in abundantly. Business is resuming, and rebuilding is going on in every direction.

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ENGLAND.

Mr. Bradlaw at an immense meeting held in London on the 17th declared that the Queen was insane and demanded that the monarchy be entrusted to judges of law and equity, until a Republic could be established.

FRANCE.—Bismarck, Ministerial organ, announces that Bismarck and Poyser-Querier have signed the long pending customs treaty between France and Germany.

GERMANY.—The Emperor William opened the sessions of the Reichstag in person on the 18th. He began his address with a review of the past session of the North German Parliament, and of the course of German unification.

SPAIN.—The political party of which Senor Sagasta is the head, has issued a manifesto in which it acknowledges the sovereignty of the National Government as now constituted, and insists on the maintenance of the national dominions.

HOLLAND.—Advices from the Hague report great dissatisfaction with the present government. The most violent proclaimed their perfect sympathy with Republicans everywhere and with the International Society, and declared that the faith of the Republicans of Spain identical with the liberty and equal rights now rapidly spreading through all the countries of Europe.

MEXICO.—Juarez has been re-elected President by Congress, receiving 108 votes, all that were cast. The opposition abstained from voting.
