LETTER FROM PASS CHRISTIAN.

PASS CHRISTIAN, July 26, 1873.

Dear Morning Star: We are on the Pass; and in that one aspect we wish you to imagine our wonder that already crowded and popular watering place is not preferred by city folks to Northern summer resorts.

The entertainments, consisting of music, essays, orations, declamations, etc., were allowed the three nights of the examining days; Tuesday night being the first.

The War Department has received information that the court has found all the Modoc guilty of murder and that Gen. Davis is only waiting the endorsement of the verdict to carry out the order.

Twenty-two Chinese females brought by steamer from Hong Kong, were sold at public auction in San Francisco on the 29th ult.

Oration "Nature and the Poets," was spoken entirely too fast by Mr. R. K. Lacoste, yet, on account of its singularly good composition, some doubts were suggested as to its originality.

Oration, "Popular Opinion," by Mr. R. R. Riddell. As this young aspirant only gave us the pleasure of listening to about one-fourth of his composition, we can give no judgment as to its merits or faults.

Oration, "The French Revolution," by J. Tesson and H. Burke, was so well appreciated as to receive an encore. The like good fortune awaited a spirited gallop by the college orchestra.

Wednesday Evening. We were astonished on entering the hall, to see such an array of fashion and beauty. Hardly a seat was vacant.

Music, piano, N. Burke. This young musician gave great pleasure by his able performance, and received an encore. Disertation "Civilization," J. Curtis.

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Thursday Evening. The salutatory, by Mr. G. S. Corkery, was most clearly and elegantly worded and delivered. After welcoming the audience, he spoke a few words on education and then gracefully glided into the discussion of one of the effects of the present system—moderate Liberalism.

Mr. H. B. Broussard, discussed, under the title of "National Fortitude," the wrongs of Louisiana. He was followed by Mr. James R. Knapp, A. B., with a most beautiful oration, "Our country."

After the diploma had been awarded to the graduates of the commercial department, the degree of A. B. was conferred on Messrs. Tierman and Brant and that of A. M., on Messrs. Knapp and Whitaker.

Hon. James E. Egan, ex-Mayor of Baton Rouge, died on the 31st ult.

The Mexican Government is about to send 6000 troops to the Rio Grande.

Millions of grasshoppers have appeared in the vicinity of Sioux City. Their general course is southwest.

In the late fire at Baltimore the Sisters of Notre Dame and St. Alphonsus school loss \$30,000, but were insured.

The railroad from Shreveport to Dallas, Tex., 190 miles, is complete and trains will commence running in a few days.

It is reported that as soon as the Japanese Embassy returns from Europe, all of Japan will be thrown open to foreigners.

One hundred Deputies of the French Assembly recently sent to the Pope an address assuring him of their continued devotion.

The President has confirmed the pardon of the North and South Carolina Kluklux prisoners, recently recommended by the Attorney General.

The march of the German troops evacuating French territory commenced on the 3rd. ult., and will last until the 5th August. They will proceed to Germany by way of Kehl.

After the services in church, the remains were borne to the new St. Louis Cemetery, followed by a large number of friends, among whom were delegations from the Total Abstinence Society, the Catholic Militant Union, and the Society of St. Vincent de Paul, of which associations he was a member.

Mr. Cannon leaves a wife—and for some months past prostrated by a severe accident which occurred at the late Fair in Algiers, breaking her leg—and two daughters, the elder of whom, Miss Theresa, is well known to our community as a most excellent musician, but more particularly as the generous benefactor of all our religious institutions and societies, none of which have ever asked her assistance in vain.

When parents wish to have their children sent home, they should give timely notice, settle all accounts, and forward the traveling expenses; and if it be before the end of the session, notice should be given two weeks in advance.

The session commences on the first Monday in September, and ends on the Wednesday before the last Thursday in June.

The religion professed and taught in the College is the Catholic. Students of other denominations are admitted, provided they are willing for the sake of order and uniformity, to attend the public exercises of religious worship.
