DOMESTIC CATHOLIC INTELLIGENCE.

The collection on the 8th of June, in the Diocese of New York, for the Pope, amounted to \$27,531 38.

On the Feast of the Sacred Heart, Woodstock College, the Provincial House of the Jesuit Fathers in Maryland, was dedicated to the Patronage of the Most Sacred Heart, and will hereafter be known as "The College of the Sacred Heart."

Five converts were baptized in St. Jerome's Church, North New York, Worcester County, on Monday July 7th, making in all sixty-one received into the fold here since Feb. 16th.

Death of Father O'Hara.—We learn that Father O'Hara, a Catholic priest, died suddenly in Augusta, Thursday morning, at half-past three o'clock.

The Church in Portugal.

Portugal seems to be making a slight movement in favor of religion. Not many days since, the King sent a letter of compliment to his Holiness, on the occasion of the twenty-seventh anniversary of his accession to his throne; a few days later, on June 30th, Cavalier Antonio Braz presented his Holiness with a large sum of money and an address from the Catholics of Braga, Portugal.

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Worthy of a King.

The King of Bavaria has surprised his friends by an act of moral courage and of Catholic faith which they did not expect from him.

Louis II, King of Bavaria, has disappointed and grieved the faithful over and over again; for a mistaken notion of what is his true and safest policy he has placed the state in the position of arbitrariness over the Church, and for this undoubtedly (like the rest of those monarchs who forget the words of Scripture, "by Me kings reign,") he will be made to feel that "Louis II, after all, is a Bavarian, and believes in the Real Presence, and when the intelligence reached him of the iniquitous order issued by his unworthy officer, his Catholic blood reached a most congruous pitch of excitement, and he straightway countermanded the decree and reprimanded the offender, insisting that the army of Bavaria should occupy that place in the great procession which has belonged to it by right for generations.

This is noble and king-like, and as the Bavarians, during the last ghastly war, bore the brunt of nearly every battle, it might be awkward for imperial Prussia to quarrel with the brave little state which it has managed to absorb with its own unhealthy and unwieldy greatness.

What has been, the same also shall be, and a Bavarian monarch may still be found to assert the privileges of the Church and to offer himself and his crown for the protection of the Sovereign Pontiff.
