continually interfered with by the roots and floating wood. No other boat of this description has ever been built, the screw propeller being found superior to the swan-foot invention.


Here, however, is a newly-devised vessel, with radical and novel improvements both above and below the water line.

The difference in the length of the cables in the East river bridge, Brooklyn, when the thermometer registers zero and when it registers 100 degrees above, is two feet four inches.




