

Forty-Four Men Have Entered the Various Events.

Those Who Have Entered

The Bicycle and Foot Races—Five-Mile Bicycle Race the Event of the Day.

The entries for the great field day on Monday, July 5, closed last Wednesday night and the committee are more than pleased, for the list is the largest and best ever received here. There are a total of 44 different men entered in 100 events. The morning program begins at 10:30.

The 1.5-mile bicycle race for boys, 15 years and under, will be hotly contested by C. Fredstrom and H. Light. They have even honors now, each having won a race. This race will decide who is the better boy of the two. Fifty-yard dash—M. Rodi, J. Kaiser, A. Sobey and F. Hall. The latter is a little too old for the other boys, but too small too run with the next class. So the rest will have a five-foot handicap over him. In the 3.5-mile novice for members, N. Kaiser and T. Crago will compete. 220-yard dash—W. Lyon, F. Goodsole, W. R. Weir; 75-yard dash, for boys 15 years and under—L. C. Fredstrom, A. Hearter and C. Penhall; Running hop, step and jump, for members who have never competed—A. Gipp, W. R. Weir, W. Lyon, and O. H. Kohlhaas; 100-yard dash, for members 18 years and under who have never raced—F. Goodsole, W. R. Weir; One-mile bicycle race, for members in the 3-minute class or over.

Johnson will have charge of the stands and he will serve refreshments of every description all day long.

The afternoon program will begin at 2 o'clock sharp. The first event will be a one-mile novice race, and, as there are nine entries, it will be run in two heats, the men making the fastest time will receive the prizes. A time limit will be set on this race by the referee; first heat—J. Crellen, J. Vincent, J. Rowe, J. Lean and J. Cane; second heat—F. Tamblin, E. Daniels, T. Rowe, W. Coker, D. Houle. That there will be two hot races there is no possibility of a doubt. Next is a 100-yard dash—F. Goodsole. W. R. Weir, F. Distel, J. St. Antoine. The last named, it is said, is a remarkable sprinter. Next is a 1.5-mile handicap bicycle race. This also must be run in two heats, as there are eleven entries; first heat—Duncan, Leary, Davey and Distel on the scratch; J. Wills, 4 yards; J. Phillips, 6 yards; second heat—C. Light, Monroe and Vincent on scratch; J. Rowe, 3 yards; T. Crago, 6 yards. The two men making the fastest time will receive the prizes. It is predicted that all previous records will be broken in this race. Next on the program will be a half-mile handicap run by Lyon and Stephens. Lyon, scratch; Stephens, 75 yards. Putting 16-pound shot—McBuff and McKenzie. Two-mile handicap bicycle race—Leary, scratch; Light, 30 yards; Monroe, 30 yards; Distel, 30 yards; Tamblin, 40 yards; Crellen, 60 yards. The referee will set a time limit on this race. One-mile handicap run—Lyon, scratch; Stephens, 165 yards. Three-fifth-mile handicap bicycle race—Duncan, Leary, Light and Monroe, scratch; Vincent, 10 yards; Davey and Distel, 15 yards; Phillips, 20 yards. The referee will set a time limit on this race. 220-yard dash—F. Distel, W. R. Weir, Goodsole, St. Antoine. One-mile handicap bicycle race—Leary and Duncan, scratch; Monroe and Light, 10 yards; Distel and Cane, 20 yards. Pole vault—Hendrickson, Crago, Coggin, Clymo. Running broad jump—Goodsole, Hendrickson, Weir. Three-fifth-mile special bicycle race, for those that have never raced, first heat—Wills, Croker, Clymo, Crellen, Houle; second heat—Tamblin, Derrick, T. Rowe, Kaiser, Cane. Throwing 12-pound hammer—McRae and Mc. Duff. 440-yard dash—Distel, Stephens Lyon, St. Antoine. The last of the events and the race of the day will be a five-mile handicap bicycle race—Leary and Duncan, scratch; light, 80 yards; Distel, 100 yards; Lean 150 yards; Crellen, 200 yards, and an unknown, whom the referee will put on the track. They say he is a dark horse and a regular whirlwind on wheels. Leary and Duncan will have to look out for their laurels. General admission to park, 25 cents; children, 10 cents.
