

"Hot Time" In Jail

Furniture and Other Villiage Property Smashed

Jail Filled With Disorderlies

Street Fighters and Drunks Were Numerous Saturday Night and Sunday Morning.

There was a veritable hot time in the village lockup last Saturday night or rather Sunday morning, for the numerous prisoners who were incarcerated were filled with Red Jacket whiskey and bent on getting even with the municipality in some way for having been arrested. Up to 12 o'clock things were rather slow with the officers and only two arrests were made, but after that hour they began to come in in pairs until eight or nine were pulled.

Then they began to smash the furniture in the jail and about everything that was in sight was broken to pieces. But if they figured on getting even with the village in this manner they made a serious mistake, for it was added to the amount of the damages assessed in the justice courts yesterday.

Business in the courts never was as brisk for many a day as it was yesterday. The cases were nearly all drunks and disorderlies and a few rows. Officer Ward arrested a couple of well known young men whom he caught engaged in a fist encounter in the alley between Fifth and Sixth streets. They, with a few of their friends, were having the matter out with all the seriousness of professional pugilists. The entire party was somewhat the worse for drink and it seems that the two in question had some quarrel between themselves earlier in the evening and were about to settle it in true sportsman style.

The fight had progressed to about the fifth round when the police interfered and the two fighters were landed in the jail by Mr. Ward.

When up before Justice Curtis yesterday they pleaded guilty to the charge and were assessed a fine of \$5 and costs each, which they paid. The men who held the sponges were not arrested.

Officer Murphy also arrested a couple of men for participating in a row on the street near the News office at a late hour Saturday night. They were stopped by the officer and told to go home and he would not arrest them, but they continued their fighting and were doing each other up rather promiscuously when he arrested two of the party and the rest got away. The two in question were named Sacris and Laskey Jackola and each paid a \$10 fine before Justice Curtis, which amount included the costs. The officer has a warrant for the arrest of another who was in the same party.

Officer Beck arrested a female who has been around town for some time and is decidedly of the soiled dove order. She was making quite a disturbance on the street and the marshal thought the town was better rid of such characters. He took her to the end of the city and gave her an hour to get out. She got, and it safe to say that she will not be back soon, unless she wants to be sent over for a short time in the county jail.

A man named McNab also paid a fine of \$3 and costs before Justice Curtis yesterday for being drunk Saturday night. He was arrested by the marshal and pleaded guilty to the charge preferred.

In Justice Fisher's court there were four cases yesterday. Officer Stukle had Vic Granhall up for being drunk and disorderly on the street last Saturday night and Oscar Johnson was up for the same offense. They both pleaded guilty and paid small fines and the costs of court.

Officer McLelland arrested a couple of men named John Hanko and John Maggi for creating a noise and disturbance on the location Saturday night. They both made deposits for their appearance but so far have failed to show up.
