Thompson Gains the Honor at the Superior Ice Rink.

Davey Takes Second Money

Edie Gilmore Finished Up Well in the Race, the Company Being Too Swift for Him.

The championship race between the fastest skaters of the county, took place at the Superior ice rink in Laurium last evening and proved to be about as fine a race as has ever taken place in the county. It resulted in the defeat of Davey by Thompson, which was the real race, and decided beyond all doubt that Thompson is the speedier skater of the two.

The amount of interest that was centered on this contest on skates may be judged by the fact that the attendance numbered a little short of a thousand people and the rink was so crowded that it was impossible to enjoy the skating or dancing until some of the crowd dispersed after the race. This in face of the numerous other attractions shows that ice skating races are very popular.

When the race was called five skaters showed up, Davey, Thompson, Lean, Goldworthy and Gilmore. It was decided to start three men on one side of the rink and two on the other. Thompson, Lean and Goldworthy started on one side and Davey and Gilmore on the other. They all got away together with Thompson slightly in the lead. Every man went for all the speed there was in him, but Thompson kept the lead on his side and Davey on the other and these two were about even for several laps. When about half the race was over Thompson's strength stood him in good stead and he gradually began to forge ahead of Davey and finished the race about a quarter of a lap in the lead. It was a hot chase from beginning to end and both men put up a fine race. The time was 3:41.

Goldworthy and Lean also skated well, but the former dropped out a few laps from the finish. Gilmore's rising star as an ice skater took a terrible tumble last night. In his former race with Davey when he was also beaten, he skated with that smile on his face, which said plainer than words, "I can do him if I want to, wait until next time." But he didn't have any time to smile last night. The pace was entirely too swift. He is about seven classes too high when he tries to skate with either Thompson or Davey.

The band boys are to be congratulated on the success of the race and have the satisfaction of knowing that they gave the cleanest race and most satisfactory race when so many men were entered that has taken place here for a long time. It is no small affair to run a race of the kind last evening as it takes good management to do the thing fairly and squarely to all concerned. Messrs. John Gillis, F. H. Lathrap, and Morgan Williams acted as judges of the race. On account of the weather the rink will not be open this evening.

A Good Work.
