

Medical Men Gather.

A Notable Meeting at the Hospital Last Evening.

The Address of The Evening

Delivered By Prof. Vaughn of The University of Michigan—Other Local Events.

There was a notable gathering of medical men of the two counties at the Calumet hospital last evening when Prof. Victor C. Vaughn, who is dean of the department of medicine and surgery at the University of Michigan and perhaps one of the most distinguished hygienic teachers and writers in the country today, was present and gave an address.

When it was known that Dr. Pomeroy had made arrangements with Dr. Vaughn to visit this city, the physicians of the county looked forward with pleasure to the event and they were more than pleased with the doctor and the able paper he presented. Prof. Vaughn's subject was "The White Blood Corpuscle" and the paper is pronounced by all the physicians as exceedingly interesting. After the reading of the paper a general discussion of the subject by the physicians was indulged in and after that the wants of the inner man were attended to by Mine Host Jud P. North, of the Calumet Hotel, in a very pleasing way. Lemonade and ice water is said to have been one of the courses and the doctors all say they never enjoyed an evening as well for many a day.

Beside the members of the Calumet staff, the other physicians practicing about the city and the staff of the Bigelow syndicate of mines, there were present Drs. McKee, of Central; Hosking, of Allouez; Downer, Burnham and McElveen, of Hancock; Wheeler, Jones and Maas, of Houghton; Abrams, of Dollar Bay; Fischer and Orr, of Lake Linden, and Luna, of Marquette.

Dr. Vaughn arrived in the city on the afternoon train yesterday and is the guest of Dr. E. H. Pomeroy during his stay. He was more than pleased with the new hospital at Calumet and pronounced it one of the best equipped in the country.

Made Quick Time.

The Soo Light Guard has not, as yet, demonstrated much ability to bluster or show off nicely on dress parade, but Captain Welsh and his officers and men have demonstrated that they are ready for actual service and can be on their way to the front in quick time. A call to arms was sounded by the court house bell, at 7:30 Tuesday night, without previous knowledge to the members of the company. The men were scattered throughout the city, some over a mile from the armory, while others were in Canada attending a Christian Endeavor society meeting. The company assembled, dressed in heavy marching equipment and marched in double quick time to the depot, one mile distant from the armory, in thirty-seven minutes from the first tap of the bell. Over 90 per cent. of the entire company reached the depot in the time as above stated.—Soo News.
