LAKE BENNETT, N. W. T., May 5, '98.

# Cuban Army Is Ready.

Over 9,000 Men Now Stationed At Points Around The City Of Santiago.

Cubans Will Co Operate With U S. Army.

Argentine Republic Minister Writes a Letter Reflecting Upon the United States Government.

KEY WEST, June 15-The British steamer Twickenham, captured off Kingston by the auxiliary cruiser St. Louis, arrived here today in charge of a prize crew.

TAMPA. June 15-Col. Hemandez, of the Cuban army, brought a letter to Gen. Miles announcing that Gen. Garcia with 9,000 men were taking possession of points near Santiago and were ready to co-operate in an attack upon the city.

Washington, June 15-The minister of the Argentine Republic at Washington has written a letter reflecting upon the United States government which has found its way into print in the Argentine newspapers and the matter will be investigated.

Eleven O'Clock A. M.

TAMPA, Florida, June 14.—The fleet consisting of thirty-five transports and fourteen convoys sailed this morning. This fleet was officially reported to have left Key West yesterday morning, but it has now undoubtedly started.

Madrid, June 14.-Duke Almodovar de Rio, the minister of foreign affairs, told the newspaper men today that the Spanish government had not taken any steps in the direction of negotiations for peace.

The minister also said he had not received any confirmation of the reported third attack on Santiago de Cuba

General Correa, the Minister of War, declared that the situation at Manila was better than supposed and said that General Augusti had concentrated 20,000 men for the defense of the city and that the batteries of artillery there comprise no less than 199 long range guns.

It is officially announced today that Senor Dubose, the former Charge d'affaires at Washington, and Lieutenant Carranza, the former naval attache at Washington, had been invited to leave Canada, owing to the Canadian authorities having intercepted a letter which Lieutenant Carranza had addressed to the Minister of Marine, giving an account of the condition of the American fiortifi-

San Francisco, June 15 .- The transports China, Colon and Zealandia and Senate, conveying second expedition to the Philippines, will sail between 12 and 2 today unless something unforeseen occurs to prevent their departure.

### BIRD OF UNCANNY MIEN.

Basrard With a Toesin Terrifles the Superstitious of a Maryland County.

A bird of uncanny mien, with a bell around its neck, has been hovering around certain sections of Howard county, Md., filling the breasts of the colored population with terror, for the descendants of Ham in this hilly and picturesque country believe that the advent of the bird is a sign of impending war. The visitor is a buz- delphia Press. zard. Those who claim to have obtained a pear and clear view of the bird assert that the bell was plainly visible, but they could not determine whether it was attached by cord or a wire.

The other buzzards that float over the erags and along the course of the Patapsco, ever alert for the stray carcasses of cows and horses that escape the fertilizer factory or the sausage manufacturer, regard this strange visitor with a great deal of awe. The feathered seer, wrapped in its own originality, avoids the company of bird, beast and man. It seeks the wildest rocks in the county, where for hours it looks far into the future. Visions of bloody fields, of flashing steel, of thundering cannon and the music of despairing groans enterof flashing steel, of thundering cannon and the nusic of despairing groans entertain it during its long vigils, so the superstitious say. Tiring of such amusement, it leaves its solitary rock and spreads its wings, the broad shadow of which moves apprehensively over the housetops, across the fields and the streams, causing alarm and dread.

No one has as yet seen this weary bird take sustenance. It is said it has been fasting long, and that its days of feasting will not begin until carnage arrives, for it is so constituted as to be unable to swallow anything but human flesh or to slake its thirst in anything but human blood. It is a stranger to sleep. Nothing can wrap it in afumber but the lullaby of


