

# Death of Will Dolan.

## Lieut. Thielman Sends the Sad News To Calumet.

### A Victim of Yellow Fever.

#### Mr. Hoeking Informs His Mother Who is Heartbroken Over the News.

Postmaster W. H. Hoeking received the following telegram which probably left Santiago de Cuba yesterday as it was received here today:

SANTIAGO DE CUBA.  
W. H. Hoeking, Calumet, Mich.  
Dolan is dead.

The Dolan referred to is Mr. Will Dolan, who, up to the time of his going to Cuba, had acted as mail carrier in the Calumet district ever since the free delivery service was inaugurated. The news of his death cast a gloom over the entire office force, with whom he was a general favorite, and the news will be heard with regret by the entire community. No details of the death were given, but it is generally supposed he died a victim of the dreaded yellow fever and which is known to exist at Santiago. He must have succumbed to its ravishes very suddenly, as the last letter the NEWS published from the front made particular mention of Mr. Dolan as being well and in excellent spirits.

The receipt of the news of his death was made known to his mother by Mr. W. H. Hoeking, who went to the Centennial where she lives to see her personally. She is heartbroken over the news and was a terrible blow to her. As the message was sent by Lieut. Thielman, of Dolan's company, there is no reason to discredit the truth and reliability of the telegram.

#### The Hermann Sons Reunion.

This event will take place on Tuesday next at Houghton and will be participated in by the two lodges of Calumet together with the other lodges of the county. The delegation to attend from this city promises to be very large, as a committee have waited on the Calumet and Hecla company and all Hermann Sons in their employ who can be spared will be given a day off. Great preparations are being made for the occasion by the people of Houghton and the old town will be gaily decorated, the like of which has never been seen in this district as several hundred dollars have been appropriated for the decorations of the street.

The Calumet members of the O. D. H. S. will go down on the 8:05 a. m. train and on their arrival at Houghton will take part in the big parade of all the lodges of the county and in which the grand officers of the lodge will participate. The afternoon will be spent in Haas' park where speeches by prominent men of the order will be made. The attractions will be many and the attendance is sure to be large. A special rate of 50 cents for the round trip has been made on the Mineral Range. Children under 5 years free; children from 5 to 12 years half fare. The tickets will be good from Sunday morning until 11 o'clock Tuesday night.

#### Arrested For Drunkenness.

Last evening Officer Alex Kerr, of the Calumet and Hecla police force, was called upon to arrest James Connors on complaint of Victor Kowalek, charging him with being a common drunkard and with creating a disturbance at the plaintiff's home in Raymbaultown. Connors spent the night in the village cooler and this morning was quite sober when taken before Judge Fisher to answer to the charge preferred. After the judge had read the complaint and asked the prisoner whether he was guilty or not, he replied, "I suppose so." Thereupon the judge imposed a fine of \$25 and costs, in default of which Connors was taken to Houghton on the afternoon train to spend the next thirty days with Sheriff Lean.
