HAS WOMAN ARRESTED FOR CUTTING HIS HEAD OPEN

John Brackelich appeared in Justice Fisher's court this morning and swore out a warrant for the arrest of Savata Sura, a married woman, living at Osceola, alleging that she struck him over the head with an iron ladle because he wished to return an empty beer case. The alleged affair happened this morning. The man showed the cut in court. It is fully three inches in length and half an inch in depth. The man had lost a quantity of blood and appeared dazed. His face was covered with blood.

According to the story Brackelich told in court, one of the local brewery teamsters called at the house he resides in, which is a three family one, and asked for the return of some empty beer cases. Brackelich started to help the teamster to load them on to the brewery wagon, when he alleges Mrs. Sura interfered and dared Brackelich to touch them. The complaining witness stated that he started to argue with the woman and that without warning she swung the ladle she was carrying, and brought it with force down on his head.

Officer Cameron has had the warrant for the woman's arrest placed in his hands and he will serve it some time this afternoon.

PYTHIAN STATE HOME IS PROJECTED BY GRAND LODGE

Michigan Knights of Pythias are holding their annual grand lodge meeting in Lansing and with them are the Pythian Sisters for the annual grand temple meeting.

WATER TO BE ANALYZED FOR POSSIBLE TYPHOID GERMS

Owing to the Prevalence of Typhoid Fever in This District the Red Jacket Board of Health Will Have Water Tested to Ascertain if That is Cause of the Epidemic.

Owing to the prevalence of typhoid fever in Red Jacket, and the fact that the disease is making headway, Health Officer P. D. MacNaughton has ordered a sample of Red Jacket's drinking water to be sent to Dr. V. Vaughn of Ann Arbor, for analysis. Marshal Trudell, who is a member of the board of health, this morning secured a large bottle of the water, and shipped it to Dr. Vaughn. The result of this analysis will be eagerly awaited locally.

It is likely that if the water is found contaminated in any way, that an order will be issued to boil all water before using. This is one of the best preventatives as it kills all germs that may be in the water.

Typhoid fever, is not confined to Red Jacket by any means. There are cases all over the district, but the local board of health has determined to ascertain if the water is responsible for the outbreak here.

BILLIARD TOURNAMENT TO BE ARRANGED AT Y. M. C. A.

Arrangements are being made by billiard enthusiasts connected with the Y. M. C. A. to organize a billiard tournament. A meeting of those interested will be called in the near future when the details will be worked out. It is proposed to offer some sort of a trophy, probably a silver loving cup to be won three years in succession. The name of the winner each year would be suitably inscribed on the cup, and it would be left on exhibition in the lobby of the association, with other trophies that have been annexed by the association's athletes.

It is figured that there will be an entry of something like 75 to 100 billiard players. The billiard tables of the local association are being patronized extensively, and the game has taken a very firm hold of the members. Later, it is probable that a picked team from the association will arrange matches with other billiard team experts in Calumet.

Later he has been engaged in business for himself in Minnesota. He recently sold out to enter into partnership with Mr. Sterk.

DISCONTINUE LIGHTS.

A meeting of the Calumet Conventions committee was held yesterday afternoon at the Red Jacket town hall, to consider matters of importance. It was decided to discontinue the street illuminations in Red Jacket, as the expense of making them permanent is prohibitive.

The committee decided to hold another meeting about November 1 at which time the final reports will be prepared and a general statement of accounts made public. The members of the committee are anxious that all bills be submitted by October 15th so that the books may be properly audited and closed.

BIRK INQUEST TONIGHT.

The inquest in the case of Andrew Birk, the unfortunate man who was picked up in an insensible condition late on the night of September 17 on Pine street, and who died the following day in the Calumet Public hospital without regaining consciousness, will be held in Justice Fisher's court this evening. It is not believed that there is any evidence to show that foul play occurred.
