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MASONS TO HOLD ANNUAL REUNION IN NOVEMBER

Preliminary arrangements are being made for the annual reunion of the thirty-second degree Masons of Ontonagon, Baraga, Keweenaw and Houghton counties in the copper country during the month of November. The gathering will probably be held about Nov. 15, in Houghton or Calumet. There are 16 members of the Detroit, Grand Rapids and other consistories in the copper country, and it has been the custom to hold reunions at regular intervals to bring the members of this order together. It was originally planned to have the gathering take place early in November but owing to the fact that the Palestine commandery of Houghton has planned a special session for November 9, the reunion was deferred. Invitations have already been issued to the members of this degree in the copper country, and a sufficient number of responses have been received to warrant definite plans which will be made shortly.

It is expected that the gathering will take the form of a big banquet, and speakers will be secured from each town in the copper country. It is likely that Senator Chas. Smith of Lake Linden, the only thirty-third degree Mason in this section will be asked to act as toastmaster of the evening, and will probably be prevailed upon to give a short talk. Other speakers will probably be Robert Shields of Houghton, C. D. Hanchette of Hancock, and Gordon R. Campbell of Calumet.

WIRE FIXTURES STOP CLOCK.

Big Bell Will Be Rung as Curfew Signal for the Village.

It was ascertained this morning that the reason for the Red Jacket town clock stopping yesterday afternoon fixtures that have been used in the lighting decorations of the Red Jacket town hall became dislodged from their fastenings and got entangled in the hands of the clock, thus putting the big timepiece out of business. This morning an employe of the Hosking electrical firm went into the clock tower and disengaged the wires from the hands.

The recent gale was responsible for the accident, it is presumed. As yet the clock has not been placed in commission, but it likely will be before the day has passed.

Arrangements are being made, too, to attach a large rope to the clapper of the big bell of the clock, so that the bell may be used for curfew purposes. As soon as the rope has been installed the curfew bell will be rung regularly at night.

ELKS AWARD CONTRACTS FOR DECORATIONS AND FIXTURES

Interior of the New Temple Will be Equipped With Every Convenience for Members—Lodge Room Will be Elaborately Decorated—Billiard Tables are Ready.

At a meeting of the House Committee of the Calumet lodge of Elks held yesterday, the Hosking Electrical company was awarded the contract to install the permanent electrical fixtures in the new Elks' temple. The contract price is \$400. The fixtures in the lodge room will be in harmony with the general scheme of decorations. The fixtures in use now are only temporary, and were installed and loaned to the lodge by the Hosking company.

The temple has been equipped throughout with an electric bell service. Tungsten lights are to be used in the lighting scheme.

The Chicago Decorating company of Laurium, of whom F. J. Pentafold is the head, has secured the contract to finish the woodwork decorations. The woodwork was treated with a coat of filler earlier this summer in order to get the rooms in presentable shape for the state convention. This was only a temporary process. Now the woodwork will be oiled, and a coat of Japanese put on. The lodge room ceiling will be paneled, and with harmonious decorations the interior of the lodge room will present most attractive appearance.

The workmen employed by the Brunswick-Balke-Collender company of Chicago to install the pool and billiard tables and bowling alleys completed the setting up of the two billiard tables yesterday.

STRONG PASTOR IS LOST TO DETROIT CONFERENCE

Rev. Herbert D. Deetz, pastor of the Cass Avenue Methodist church of Detroit for the past two years, has practically severed his connection with the church and expects to leave shortly for Rochester, N. Y., to become pastor of the Asbury Methodist church of that city, one of the biggest churches of the denomination in the east. He will likely be succeeded here by Rev. F. S. Rowland, until recently pastor of the Asbury church, says the Detroit Journal.

The proposed transfer was suggested by Bishop Hamilton of Buffalo, who called Mr. Deetz up on the long distance telephone and asked him if he would accept the pastorate of the Asbury church, allowing Mr. Rowland to come to the Cass Avenue church. The bishop explained that Mr. Rowland had resigned from the Asbury church expecting to take charge of another church; that the negotiations slipped a cog somewhere and prevented Mr. Rowland from getting his expected change. The bishop also added that Mr. Rowland was free to return to the Asbury church, but preferred not to do so, after resigning.

Mr. Deetz thought the matter over carefully and then sent word to the bishop, saying he would go to Rochester. As yet he has received no reply from the bishop.

Rev. Deetz is well known in Calumet, having attended the Detroit M. E. conference in this city last year. One of the local pastors in commenting upon the new appointment today stated that the Detroit M. E. conference is losing a very strong man in Deetz's retirement.

ASSAULT CASE ADJOURNED.

Absence of Attorneys is Responsible for Short Adjournment.

The case of Mrs. L. Cura of the Oscoda location, charged with assault and battery on one John Blanic, of the same location, was to have been heard in Justice Fisher's court this morning, but owing to the absence of prosecuting attorney W.
