GOLDEN EAGLE LODGES FORMALLY AFFILIATED

At a joint meeting of the members of the McKinley Castle of Palmsdale and Garfield Castle of Calumet, Knights of the Golden Eagle, held in the Union Temple of Honor Hall Saturday evening, the lodges decided to affiliate. The Palmsdale Castle decided to surrender its charter and will return its paraphernalia to the Grand Lodge at once. The amalgamation of the two lodges really commences with the meeting held Saturday evening, but will be dated from the first of October. The by-laws of Garfield Castle did not need to be changed in any way, the Palmsdale members joining the local lodge under the present by-laws.

The amalgamation of the two lodges will give Garfield Castle of Calumet one of the largest memberships in the state. The Palmsdale lodge boasted between forty and fifty members in good standing and the Calumet lodge has about 100 members, bringing the total membership up to over 200. The meetings will probably be held on Saturday night in the future, that night being more suitable to the members from out of town. The motto of a meeting night was not formally decided, however.

It was decided at the meeting Saturday to organize a side or fourth degree in connection with the combined lodges, the objects of which will be purely social. A committee was authorized to meet and to select suitable degree work for the new degree, and as soon as this has been done, the members will hold another meeting at which time officers will be elected and the social club entirely organized.

ANENT LIEUTENANT GOVERNOR.

Plan Under Consideration to Abolish His Only Prerogative.

One of the stories brought to this city by politicians interested in the formation of lines for next year's battle for the state offices and legislature is to the effect that there will be an effort to take from the lieutenant governor the power to name the senate committee, says the Lansing Republican. In the past people of the state have generally considered that office a place for a man content to be a mere figurehead, but there has been gradually aroused a suspicion that certain men appreciated all the time that it was a position of much importance, and quietly saw to it that the right "figurehead" was selected. In order that the right kind of committee might be named in the senate to handle legislation. Now the senators, or some of them, want to make the place one of mere form, with the only power the lieutenant governor possesses taken from him, and by means of a committee of committee, plan the members of the august body on committee. It is said the plan has already been discussed and if the signs are right there will be an effort in that direction in 1911.

WANTS TRAP ROCK SENT DOWN FROM THE U. P.

"It is a question whether roads of limestone rock are stable enough to warrant building them," State Highway Commissioner Ely is quoted as saying. "I begin to think that unless 'hard heads' can be secured the gravel road is the best, and that ultimately we shall have to endeavor to bring down the trap rock from the upper peninsula for road building. You know this road construction is somewhat experimental yet, and I do not think the limestone rock roads are standing the wear the way they should. We could use the convicts at Marquette to get the stone out if we can get it transported down here for a reasonable price and furnish it at road."

Road building is growing in popularity all over the state. Sixty out of the eighty-three counties in the state have applied for state aid in building roads this summer and we have accepted 161 miles of completed roads since the first of July.

NEW COURSE AT COLLEGE.

Veterinary Science Will be Taught at M. A. C. at Lansing.

A new department has been launched at the college by a recent action of the state board of agriculture which will materially add to the standing of the M. A. C. at Lansing among colleges of its kind. The new department will be veterinary science and as soon as it is started, trained doctors of veterinary science will be turned out of M. A. C. along with the other classes of special scientists. The work will be exhaustive and of a very practical nature, and the students who select the "vet" course, will be able to go into practice as soon as they graduate.

For many years, the need of such a department has been keenly felt by the college authorities and some such action as has been taken has been contemplated for over a year. The state board authorized the college officials to start the department at their earliest convenience and an effort will be made to have the course ready by next fall, although it is not at all certain that this can be done. The new department will involve considerable expense as it will necessitate the purchase of more equipment and perhaps additions to the teaching staff. Some new buildings will also probably be needed and it is planned to provide these if necessary.

IMPORTANT MEETING OF THE COUNCIL TOMORROW EVENING

Several Matters of Interest to the General Taxpayers Will Be Taken Up, Including Requests for Rebates of Taxes—Dog Tax Collector Will Report—Village Taxes Outstanding.

Tomorrow night's meeting of the Laurium village council is likely to be an important one. A number of matters will be taken up, including village taxes, and ways and means to get in the large amount outstanding discussed. Several persons will appear before the board asking for rebates of taxes and these requests will be dealt with.

Ed. Heather, the dog tax collector, will make his first monthly report to the council, and it is expected to be a good one. Mr. Heather, it is understood, is making an excellent showing in the matter of tax collections. He is making a periodical canvass of the district and no dog owner is being overlooked. It is the intention of the dog tax collector to make every owner of a canine in the village purchase a tag, which will cost \$1. Failure to do this will mean the capture of the dog, and if not claimed within a reasonable period, it will be destroyed.

All of the new Tungsten lights have been installed in the village by the Houghton County Electric Light company, and a report to this effect will be submitted. Laurium is now as well illuminated as any village of its size in the Copper country. All of the principal streets have been supplied with lights that are giving excellent service.

Village Clerk Prisk will read his monthly report showing the financial condition of the village, and the expenditures that have been made. The October report is understood to be just as favorable as any month that has preceded it this year.

MOHAWK FIREMEN'S PARTY.

FIRE DESTROYS HALL'S SAWMILL AT STACKPOLE

A fire of unknown origin destroyed the sawmill owned by Vivian and Hall at Stackpole, early Sunday morning. The flames were discovered by two Finnish residents who live near the mill, at about 2 o'clock Sunday morning, and they had gained such headway that it was almost impossible to combat them. The mill was entirely destroyed, and the machinery will probably also be a total loss. The mill employes succeeded in preventing the flames from spreading to the lumber and other property nearby.

The sawmill was erected at Stackpole several years ago by the firm of Buzzo and Vivian. Later, upon the death of Mr. Buzzo, Robert Hall of Laurium became connected with the firm, and he has had charge of the business at Stackpole since that time. It is almost impossible to ascertain the estimated value of the mill and machinery, but it is believed that it was worth several thousand dollars. The entire plant was insured.

FLORIDA WATER SYSTEM IS COMPLETE—RATE DETERMINED

Subscribers Are Being Connected With the Mains and Meters Being Installed—Lake Water is Provided for Residents of This Location—Good Chance for Success.

The Florida water system is now complete and commenced operations for the first time this morning. The mains have all been installed, and the subscribers are being supplied with water as rapidly as the connections can be made. About twenty-five subscribers have already been supplied with the connections, and about seventy-five meters installed. The entire system contains about 13,000 feet of pipe which varies in size from 1 1/2 inch to 4 and 6 inches.

The company already has about 150 applicants for water, but 200 subscribers are expected before next spring. About ten new subscribers are being supplied with water each day. The company has decided to charge at a rate of 75 cents per 1,000 gallons or less, and all subscribers will be placed upon the meter basis. The meters are being installed as rapidly as possible.

Residents of Florida have long been anxious to secure lake water and the advent of the Florida Water company has completely solved this problem. A large number of the residents of that location are themselves stockholders in the company and will share in the profits.

BEAR SEASON IS NOW OPEN UNTIL APRIL FIRST

The season for the killing of bear and many other smaller fur-bearing animals, opened at midnight last night and continues until the first day of April. Bears are by no means scarce in several districts, notably in Keweenaw county and the following is the state law regarding the killing of fur-bearing animals.

"All wild fur-bearing animals found in this state are hereby declared to be the property of the state. No person shall take, trap, hunt, shoot, kill or molest any bear, otter, fisher, martin, fox, mink, raccoon or skunk from and including the first of April and including the first day of October of each year. Nor muskrat from and including the first day of April to and including the thirty-first day of October of each year, nor shall any person knowingly have in possession the carcass or skin of any one of the fur-bearing animals herein named, that was killed during the time when the killing thereof is by this act prohibited."
