

DECISION TO RING CURFEW EACH EVENING IS POPULAR

Not With Children Under 16 Years of Age, but With Parents Generally—Officers Will Welcome Signal and Ask Co-operation of Parents to Enforce.

The decision of the Red Jacket village council to sound the curfew each evening by the ringing of a bell attached to the town clock, is welcomed by parents generally in the village.

Jeweller J. J. Ellis will adjust the mechanism so the bell may be rung and very soon children under sixteen years will have the pleasure of hearing the curfew at 8:30 o'clock each evening, a signal that they must hurry home.

No one will be more pleased over the enforcement of the curfew law than Chief Trudell. He states that children out on the streets after 8:30 o'clock now, on being told of the time, claim that they did not know it was past the curfew hour. This is a reasonable excuse. With the curfew bell in commission, however, no such excuse will be accepted.

Parents are asked to co-operate with the officers in helping to enforce the curfew. A word to the children as to the hour they must reach home will do a lot of good, say the officers, and it is to be hoped for the sake of the children themselves that parents will not be slow in instructing their boys and girls.

SOUTH SHORE BENEFITS BY A COMPACT WITH SOO LINE

Combination Gives D., S. S. & A. an Opportunity to Arrange More Profitable Freight Routings—Little Clause in Freight Traffic Looks Innocent, but Has Vast Possibilities.

Now, that the Duluth, South Shore & Atlantic is a member of a respectable and wealthy railroad family, it will break no bones to discuss the weakness from which it suffered when it was trying to go it alone, with one end at the Soo and the other at Duluth, says the Duluth News-Tribune.

The way its rivals treated it was a sin, and a railroad can be as mean to a weak sister as a small boy when he drops a snake down the back of her neck. It was hamstringed, sewed in a sack and pounded with handspikes.

For instance, suppose the rate from New York was 41, of which South Shore got 26 cents. And suppose some naughty line to Minneapolis cut the rate to 35 cents. The cut was spread over the Soo, if the Soo made the cut, and the eastern lines participating in the haul. South Shore has got to meet that cut or let the business slide. But the eastern lines won't reduce their properties for South Shore 5 cents—the figures are not to be taken literally—for a haul of 400 miles. That is the sort of a merry life its competitors led South Shore because it had not influence enough to protect itself.

"The Quality of Mercy."

When rates went to a narrow profit for competing lines they were driven down to a loss for South Shore. Far be it from the people to propose that the rate making powers should treat the railroads as unkindly as they treated their weak sisters.

Referring again to the Wisconsin-Michigan territory from which Duluth shipments have been excluded as far as railroad discrimination could do it by the greediness of Minneapolis and its preponderant influence on the railroad lines, the South Shore was tied to the short end of the other again. On its own line the rates from Duluth into that country have been recognized as fair. Off its lines, connecting routes, the South Shore has given unsatisfactory terms to shippers. Because there were no joint rates. It is understood the other roads have refused to enter into joint rates and have charged against South Shore their own local rates. As such things go, that meant that South Shore must either make its through rates higher than they ought to be or stand a loss.

Since South Shore has become part of the Canadian Pacific-Soo family, that difficulty is lessened. It is promised that the rates in that section shall be lined up both on joint rates off the South Shore, and the Soo territory, in which heretofore the fact that a short line runs via LadySmith has been overlooked and on the Northwestern, which has been blind to the advantage in distance Duluth has as compared with Minneapolis via the Omaha to part of this territory.

Has Vast Possibilities. Glance now at the text which heads this chapter. Such clauses are found on many joint tariffs now. "I first noticed it about two years ago," said

a Duluth shipper, "on a Southern Pacific tariff. Since then it appears in a form similar to that in a great many schedules. It is an innocent evading clause but it has vast possibilities."

As a matter of fact it is probably illegal. Courts have repeatedly held that the shipper has a right to say how his consignment shall be routed, and the consignee has an equal right as soon as the stuff becomes his property. But it does not make much difference whether it is legal or not so long as the railroads can make it stick. And so far as a local agent is concerned, it is not his business to be a supreme court. All he has to do is obey orders and repeat that favorite railroad term, "impossible," when somebody suggests another routing.

So long as that clause is in effect it is in the power of associated roads to starve any line they please and fatten any line they please. And the shippers and consignees, unless they choose to go to law about it, are powerless.

Priest Will Take Charge of Greenland Church, Ontonagon County.

Rev. Father Wachtler, who has served as assistant to the Rev. Father Langan, of St. Patrick's church at Escanaba for the past 14 months, has been appointed by Bishop Egan of Marquette as pastor of the Greenland Catholic church and the mission near that place, says the Escanaba Press. Father Wachtler will leave for his new charge on Thursday morning. Since coming to Escanaba as assistant to Father Langan, Father Wachtler has made a great many close personal friends both among the members of St. Patrick's congregation and outside that church and while his leaving is regretted his appointment to a regular pastorate is in the nature of a promotion and the honor is thoroughly appreciated by all who have come to know him.

CONTRACTOR STARTS WORK ON LAURIUM PUBLIC SQUARE

Yotti Estate on First Street is Being Converted into Park—Improvements Will Cost \$200—Will Prove a Source of Civic Pride and Pleasing Retreat.

Contractor Chas. Magford of Calumet started work yesterday upon the improvements which are to be made on the Yotti property on First street, Laurium, under the direction of the Calumet civic committee. The entire lot will be improved and prepared for the planting of seed. It is believed that it will be possible for most of the seed to be planted this fall, so that it will get the advantage of an early start in the spring.

About \$200 has already been raised to provide for the improvements at the park site, and most of this money will be spent this fall. It is possible that other improvements will be made in the spring. At the regular meeting of the Laurium council, on Tuesday evening, the trustees authorized the committee to take steps to have the first public square in the village put in good condition. Those instrumental in making arrangements for the use of this property lost no time in proceeding with the project, once they had gained the permission of the council. The decedent was 47 years old, and had lived in the copper country for 16 years. He is survived by a widow, four sons and two daughters, who reside in this city, and one brother, Peter Marta.
