ISHPEMING PROVES EASY FOR HOUGHTON IN FINAL GAME

OSBORN BANNER WILL FLOAT ON NEW HOUGHTON STEAMER

The first Chase Osborn banner to be floated to the breeze was raised this afternoon on the steamer International by W. H. Labb, general manager of the White City at Houghton.

Mr. Labb says that it is the intention of the company to entirely rebuild the upper works of the International during the winter and she will be ready for business when the White City first opens its doors to the public on Decoration day, May 30, of next year.

The White City is to be made the principal attraction of the copper country. It will be located at the Portage entry where sixty acres of land has been purchased for the purpose.

Captain Charles Ripley has been engaged to take command of the International and will probably be in charge of the rebuilding of the boat this winter.
