CALIFORNIA SURE TO GET JEFFRIES-JOHNSON BATTLE

After Weeding Out the Phony Offers, the Bidding Has Settled Down to One Section and That is the Pacific Coast—Bids for Fight Will Be Opened Next Wednesday.

New York, Nov. 27.—Next Wednesday bids for the big fight will be opened and considered at the Hotel Albany here in New York, and the end of the advertising bidders will be a certainty. There have been many phony bids for this go than for any bout ever held before.

Right now the bidding has settled down to one place, and that is California. It will be between Jim Corbett and the Prince bidders. The rumors around still hint that Glosien is in with Jeffries and Berger, and will send the bids up for them, or get the fight and declare left in. There is still another in Eddie Grady, who will be here in behalf of Frisco bidders.

There will be some loud talking and some great promises made next Wednesday. Just now it's even money betting that California lands the match, as the other towns are out of consideration altogether.

Joe Humphreys, who had a bid in for some Mexican people, has quit entirely. "They were willing to have me offer \$100,000," said Joe, "and they were to own the moving pictures. LOOKS LIKE HARVARD FOR FOOTBALL SEASON OF 1910

Aggregation Will Be Composed of Veterans Next Season For of the Sixteen Men Who Were in the Line-up Against Yale Only Five Will Be Lost Through Graduation.

Harvard will have a team of veterans next season, for of the 16 men who entered Harvard's line-up in the game against Yale Saturday only five will be lost through graduation, while only ten of the entire squad will not return to college next year. With a decidedly fast freshman team to pick from the outlook for one of the best seasons in the history of football at the university next year is a most promising one.

Gl. Browne, Houston, Paul Withington, Fish and O'Flaherty are the only members of the varsity eleven who will not be eligible next year. After the election of a captain comes an inventory of the Yale material for 1910, and this is going to be a heart breaker for Yale. "Ted" Coy, who has been looked upon for three long years as the leader of strength in Yale's backfield, will graduate next June. So will Cooney, the big center, who has played for three years, and who looks like the most popular all-American center of 1909.

On either side of Cooney Yale will also lose Goebel and Andrus—the greatest guards at Yale since Heffelfinger was in the line with "Stan" Morrison—who played their last game for Yale on Saturday. So did Lilly, Hobbs, Spencer, Logan and Holt. Brown, the substitute guard, will also leave Yale next June. Behind the line, "Steve" Philbin and "Fred" Murphy, two of the best halfbacks of the year, have closed their football careers. The question comes, is there anyone left besides Daly and Kilpatrick? It is not long to name those who will form the nucleus for the 1910 team. Howe will be in college again and so will Corey, one of the other quarters of the year, but Johnson, the third quarter, will graduate in June.

For end material Yale will have Kilpatrick, Savage, Vaughan and Brooks. Naedele, the only other end of his season, will graduate in June. For tackle material there will only be Paul, who played as Lilly's substitute in both of the big games this fall. For guard material there is none in sight except what the present freshman class may furnish, and this is mighty unattractive at present.

At center the outlook is better, because both Hyde and Frances, the two lightweight substitute centers, will be back in college next fall. For backfield material there is no good fullback unless Savage is put at this position and Vaughan and Kilpatrick are kept at the ends. Deming is a good punter, but this is all that can be said for him. The halfback material will be cut down to "Jack" Field, Messinger, Robinson and Taylor, none of whom are in the same class with the halfbacks of Capt. Coy's team.

Walter Camp will have a son as a candidate for the varsity next fall. He is a big fellow and should have a football career ahead of him.
