YOST GIVES MICHIGAN MEN SIX PLACES ON ALL-WESTERN

Coach of State University Gridiron Aggregation Has Good Reasons for Choices—Gives Minnesota Four Places and Illinois One—High Opinion of Ability of Wolverines.

Above is the All-Western team picked by Fielding H. Yost, the Michigan coach. That the Wolverine leader has a high opinion of the ability of the Michigan team is attested by the fact that he gives six of his own men positions on the honorary eleven, while only two other institutions are represented. Mr. Yost gives Minnesota four places, Illinois is granted one and Wisconsin and Chicago do not get a man. Northwestern, Nebraska and Marquette also are overlooked. Notre Dame is eliminated from consideration because of the lax eligibility rules that are said to prevail down at the Indiana fount of learning.

Says Yost: "It may seem strange that I pick so many Michigan men, but I think that I have good reasons for my choices. If I had the privilege of selecting from the other teams in the west there is not a man for whom I would exchange one of these six players. This ought to be a test."

That everyone will agree with him in the selection of Benbrook, Yost takes for granted. Casey, he says, easily outplayed all of his opponents with the exception of the first half of the game with Notre Dame. "Hurry-up" believes he showed up McCree of Minnesota. Alberdie is another man concerning whom the Michigan coach thinks there can be no dispute. Magidson he considers one of the greatest backs in the game, either as a line backer or end runner, and he is a power of defense.

TIM HARRINGTON FAILED TO APPEAR SATURDAY EVENING

Ole Olson of Calumet, proved no match for O. Gronlund of South Range Saturday night when the two men wrestled in the roller rink at South Range. Gronlund threw his opponent at Cornish style in thirty minutes and thirty seconds. In his own favorite style, catch-as-catch-can, the Calumet man went down in less than a minute. The match was witnessed by a large number of enthusiasts who were well satisfied with the exhibition. Previous to the big match Karl Lehto threw a wrestler named Westman. It was generally conceded that Lehto would be the winner in this event.

But where was Tim Harrington? This is the question asked by the crowd before the big match was pulled off, for the man who was to be a match between Gronlund and Harrington. It was advertised as such and a big delegation congregated in the rink to see what the battle man would be able to do with Gronlund. Local fans are tempted to believe that Harrington is not anxious to meet the local man. His actions in quitting the ring in Calumet recently when pitted against Sidney Chapman lost him some followers, and the incident of Saturday night when he failed to put in an appearance at South Range has caused his standing in this community to take a further drop.

There is a strong probability that Olson and Gronlund will meet again in the near future, as challenges were issued at the ringside for a return match. The two men are clever and the game was not lacking in excitement Saturday evening.

COACH YOST TO RETURN.

Practically Says He Will Coach University Team Next Year.

Coach Yost, in discussing football at the close of the season last night, practically said he would be back at Ann Arbor as Michigan's coach next year and that he advised Michigan to return to the western conference. Here is the way Yost put it:

"I have been quoted as being opposed to Michigan's returning to the conference. I think that I was a little bit misunderstood in this matter. What I meant to say was that we should lie low and let things work out themselves, as they are bound to do in time. We are willing to renew our contracts with Chicago and Wisconsin at any time.

"No, I don't care to say anything about my coming back. My contract expired with the close of this season. Nothing will be done until the athletic board meets at Ann Arbor. Would I be willing to come back if terms could be made satisfactory? Well, I haven't said I wouldn't, have I?"

"I guess that Marquette-Notre Dame scoreless tie will sort of make the critics who have been picking Longman's team as the western champions revise their dope. We came under the wire ahead in two games that counted."

Ewing has stated all along that he would not allow his name to go up for renomination, and that he was in favor of an outsider. He carried his point.

At the meeting the San Francisco club was represented by Frank Ish, Los Angeles by Henry Berry, Portland





COFFROTH HAS HANDLED SOME OF BIGGEST BATTLES



Has Promoted More Important Fights Than Any Other Man in Country, and Will Now Make a Strenuous Effort to Land Coming Contest Between Jeffries and Johnson.

James Coffroth, who will make a strenuous effort to get the Jeffries-Johnson mill, has promoted more championship ring contests than any other man in the country. It was not until he took hold of the name that Coffroth managed the Jeffries-Rubin battle in 1901 with a \$31,000 gate. He promoted the second Jeffries-Fitzsimmons mill in 1902, which netted \$22,000. In 1903 Coffroth promoted the second Jeffries-Corbett fight, receipts reaching \$62,000. A year later he managed Jeff's mill with Munroe, in which the latter went to sleep in the first round.

In addition to these affairs, Coffroth handled the Britt-Nelson fight in 1904, which Britt won on a decision, and also pulled off the return match between these two in 1905, Nelson scoring a knockout in the eighteenth round. The latter event drew \$48,311. Coffroth was the originator of the forty-five round bout in California, but the law, contrary to the general belief, did not fix that as a limit, for 100 rounds are legal in that state if necessary.

Robert Fitzsimmons has readily been matched to fight Bill Lang the latter part of next month for the heavy-weight championship of Australia. Lang recently defeated the much-abused Squires for this title, and promptly accepted a challenge from Fitz, who still insists he can go some. If Fitzsimmons should whip Lang, which hardly seems possible, he probably would issue a challenge to the winner of the Jeffries-Johnson fight, and then proceed to clean up a new fortune in the Antipodes. But in this country Fitz, as a pugilist, will never be regarded seriously again. Fitz needs money, it is reported, and as Hugh McIntosh offered special inducements, he has made the long trip to Sydney to tackle Lang. Even the Sydney end in Australia is worth something, so Fitz, in all probability, isn't worrying about it.

Drank Whisky from Gutter.

A peculiar accident occurred at Aberdeen, Scotland, the other day. George Grant, an employe of Black & Ferguson, wine merchants, was ascending in an elevator in which was a 100-gallon barrel of whisky, when the rope gave way. The elevator fell to the ground, a distance of 20 feet, with such force that the cask burst, and the contents ran out of the premises into the gutter. Being a slum neighborhood, a crowd quickly gathered and made the most of their opportunities for acquiring free drinks, many of them getting down on their knees and scooping up the liquor from hand to mouth as it flowed into the gutter, while others rushed away for utensils. The man Grant sustained a dislocation of an ankle.
