ONE HUNDRED BASKETS OF GOOD THINGS FOR POOR

Salvation Army About to Begin Canvass For Funds For This Purpose.

ANNUAL CHRISTMAS CUSTOM

Adjutant Parkhouse, assisted by the members of the English Salvation Army, will shortly begin a canvass for subscriptions toward the annual Christmas baskets for the poor of this district. It is likely that the officer will start out next week with that object in view. He expects to raise enough money to provide at least one hundred baskets of "good cheer" for the deserving poor.

The baskets will contain a host of good things. In each will be a turkey, of weight according to the size of the family for which it is intended, and potatoes, bread, sugar, cranberries, and several kinds of vegetables, as well as a package of tea.

The baskets will be given away to the poor on the morning preceding Christmas Day, following the usual custom. Those who will be selected by the officers to receive the baskets will be notified to call at the Salvation Army barracks at a given time.

Adjutant Parkhouse hopes that the people of Calumet will respond to his appeal for help as in the past. Wherever possible he will make personal calls, but anyone who would like to donate and who does not receive a call from the officer or any other members of the Army may mail a check to the Army headquarters. It will be gratefully received.

While soliciting for funds, Adj. Parkhouse will also look up destitute families. A selection of the most deserving will be made with due care, so that the charity which is to be given will do the most good.

MONEY TO CORNWALL.

Pre-Holiday Season Sends Many Thousands of Dollars Abroad.

Many thousands of dollars are sent abroad from the Calumet district every year, the most of it going to Cornwall, England; Italy and Austria, with a few scattering hundreds or thousands to Bulgaria, Hungary, Roumania and other countries. Finland, too, receives from this district large sums. Most of this money is sent during the early part of December, or just previous to the Christmas holidays.

Although a great deal of the money sent abroad each year goes through the postoffice, probably the greater proportion of it goes in the form of bank drafts. The Calumet banks have exchange arrangements with banking institutions abroad which make this method very simple.
