THE CURFEW SHALL RING TONIGHT SAYS SCHUMAKER

Town Clock Bell to Sound Warning to Boys and Girls This Evening.

8 O'CLOCK STANDARD TIME

Red Jacket's curfew bell will be rung this evening at 8 o'clock standard time or 8:30 o'clock p. m. nine time. President Frank Schumaker is responsible for the statement. Janitor Schutte will ring the bell for the first time tonight.

It will be remembered that a decision to enforce the curfew ordinance in the village was reached some time ago, at the instance of Chief Trudell. Owing to the lack of a suitable attachment for the operating of the clock bell, however, there has been a delay in the enforcement.

The bell attachment is now in working order and at 8 o'clock this evening standard time, all boys and girls under the age of sixteen years who are found on the streets are likely to be challenged by the officers, and perhaps placed under arrest.

Forewarned is forearmed. Parents and children are asked to take notice. The curfew law goes into effect this evening without fail. And it will be enforced from now on, with the proviso that during the summer months, the curfew will ring just a half hour later.

The night watchmen of the village have been notified, or will be notified before they go on duty this evening, to enforce the ordinance.

TOWNSHIP TAXES, \$438,000.

This is \$85,000 More Than Last Year—Collection is Started.

Treasurer William White of Calumet township commenced the collection of the taxes in the M. & M. bank this morning. The treasurer will be there daily during banking hours until further notice.

The first taxpayer in the township to pay his taxes this morning was E. F. Loch, formerly proprietor of the Central hotel. He was closely followed by Joseph Galpeau. About \$398 was collected in small amounts before the noon hour.

The total amount of taxes to be collected this year is \$438,000, or \$85,000 more than last year. The increase is due to an increased tax for state and school purposes.

The Calumet & Hecla Mining company is the biggest taxpayer in the township, the company's taxes being about two-thirds of the whole. It is estimated that the company this year will draw a check for about \$250,000 in payment of its taxes. The Wolverine, North and South Kearsarge, Centennial, Laurium and other mining companies located in the township will also contribute considerable.

CLUB WILL MEET TONIGHT.

Instruction in Wrestling Will be Given to Finnish Athletes.

The members of the Finnish Athletic club will meet tonight in the Italian hall on Seventh street. The mats that were ordered recently for wrestling and other purposes have arrived and have been laid.

TWO FATAL ACCIDENTS IN CALUMET & HECLA MINES

Man Meets Death in the Hecla Branch and Another in the South Hecla.

WM. THOMAS AND P. SMALCIC

Two fatal accidents in the C. & H. mine were reported this morning, one being that of a Cornish miner, William Thomas, who met death from a fall of rock in No. 2 shaft of the Hecla branch, and the other, Paul Smalcic, a trammer, who died about 11 o'clock this morning from injuries received while at work last night in the South Hecla branch.

Coroner Fisher has been notified and will arrange for inquests this afternoon.

Roberts was a married man, aged 54 years, and resided at the Yellow Jacket location. He was a native of Cornwall, Eng., and is survived by a wife and family.

Smalcic was 33 years old and resided on Birch Lane, Red Jacket. He was a single man. No funeral arrangements have been made as yet.
