

## DOMINIC SUINO TALKS OF EARLY CALUMET HISTORY

Pioneer Resident Makes Interesting Statements Before Italian Club.

### ANOTHER RICH COPPER VEIN?

In a short paper which he gave before the Italian Literary club of Calumet this week on "The History of Calumet," Dominic Suino, one of the old pioneers, made a few interesting statements. One of these was that while on a visit to Rome about eight years ago, he visited the bedside of Ed. J. Hulbert the discoverer of the Calumet & Hecla mine. Mr. Suino said that he found Mr. Hulbert at that time stricken down with paralysis of the legs, which left him a helpless cripple. He told the members of the club that Mr. Hulbert discussed the finding of the Calumet lode in company with a Mr. Johnson and three or four Indians.

Mr. Suino spoke of the railroad that once ran through Fifth street, Red Jacket, carrying ore to the smelter, which was at that time located on Waverly street, near the Calumet dam. Soon after the railroad passed through Fifth street, the mining company put up a few small cottages on either side of the street for the use of the workmen. Mr. Suino said that the presence of the railroad on Fifth street accounted for the narrowness of the street as compared with the other streets in the village.

He spoke of the consolidation of the Calumet & Hecla interests, there being two mining companies before the consolidation. He also dealt with the history of the C. & H. corporation and the several nationalities that have been and are located here now. His talk was a very interesting one and a further discussion of it will take place at the next meeting of the club, to be held Wednesday evening of next week in the Italian hall.

## LAURIUM

### MILD WEATHER MAY BE DUE TO THE SUN SPOTS

This Theory Advanced By Well Known Astronomer of Marquette College.

### MAGNETIC STORMS PRODUCED

Sun spots measuring 30,000 miles along their greatest length were measured by Rev. James McGeary, S. J., professor of astronomy at Marquette college in Milwaukee, two days ago. Today Father McGeary and the pupils of the classes in astronomy made additional observations and took other measurements of the remarkable phenomenon now observable, even with the naked eye.

"It is a most remarkable outbreak, this appearance of spots on the sun at this time," said Father McGeary. "There are several spots, some of them very large. Our measurements two days ago showed two of them to be 30,000 miles in length and they apparently are increasing. Though I have no scientific basis for the statement, I believe the sun spots have something to do with this unusually fine weather which we have been enjoying. It cannot be accounted for on ordinary grounds, you know. Unquestionably the sun spots cause magnetic storms. There are now magnetic storms, as we can tell by observation of the very delicate instruments here. A magnetic storm, you understand, is, after all, a relative term, and refers to agitation of the magnetic needle. It is not, of course, a storm in the sense that the word is usually understood."

Astronomers at Yerkes observatory have been watching the spots, with interest and making careful observations, but declined to hazard any predictions as to what, if anything, they may portend.

"The spots are visible to any one using a smoked glass," said Prof. Edwin H. Frost. "They may cause magnetic storms. At sunset it is possible to see the spots without using a glass."

### LAST NIGHT'S PINOCHLE.
